The French legislative body has fixed the subscription to the three transatlantic steamship lines at fourteen million francs per annum.

The London Times tells of Queen Isabella's husband having been in a plot to delude her, and of his being under threat of trial for treason.

The Diet of Sweden had given assent to the bill for the construction of new railways, and to a law for the purpose of raising the loan to be brought out on the London and Paris markets.

It was said that Denmark was about to yield on the question of the Holstein constitution, mainly in accordance with the good offices and recommendations of the French government.

News from S. Maria speaks of the arrival of two American consuls, who had made their way up the river Amoor to Irkutsk.

A Russian expedition was to be dispatched to China, with special views.

Two delegates from Newfoundland who were sent to London on the subject of the convention concluded with the French government, regulating the right to fish on the banks of Newfoundland, have arrived in Paris, and are to be presented by the British Government.

The trial of the fourteen accused of having got up a secret society for the overthrow of the French government had been brought to a close at the Paris Tribunal of Correctional Police.

Lord Elgin proceeded without delay from Alexandria to Suez, where he found the steamer Alexandria at his disposal, with orders to convey his lordship to Singapore, where he will await the French Imperial Commissioner.

Twenty-four ships of the unken fleet have already been raised in the harbor of Sebastopol. The Sardinian government has resolved to send a ship or two to the Chinese waters, to combat alongside of the British squadron.

Notwithstanding the Bank of Rockbridge has put in circulation over eight thousand dollars of their paper, the market is not overburdened.

ADULTERATED LIQUORS. - The recent death of a young man in Brampton, Canada, from taking the "essence of brandy," with which he was manufacturing cognac, and the revelation of the fact that stychnine is largely used in the manufacture of whiskey, has awakened some attention to the nature of the drinks which are sold for pure spirits.

No secret is made of this business. The drug dealer who returns the vile imitations of medicinal liquors are made a circular from one of the best of the best, and take it as a matter of course that the adulterated liquor is made.

The adulteration of liquors is carried on a large scale abroad as in this country, and the custom house is no guaranty of purity.
