The preachers of New England, the WARD BERGERS of that day and generation, used to preach against "Tox JEFFFRSON" as vehemently as against the Devil, whose principal agent upon earth he was believed to be. Since the days of witcheraft, no one had appeared on this continent who gave such trouble to the Puritan clergy as the gentleman in the red waistcoat. Party spirit was scarcely more tolerant in the era of Madison, one of the most amiable and pacific of human beings, but who was roughly handled by those pious souls who considered it no wrong, though ministers of a religion which forbide men to speak evil of dignities, and commands them to obey magistrates, and render unto Casan the things which are Casan's, to denounce and revile the Executive in a spirit of acrid intolerance and vulgar invectives, and to stir up their congregations to disloyalty and treason.

We are all so much accustomed to venerate the "good old times," that we are reluctant to believe the party press was as indecent and relentless in former days as in our own, whereas it was a thousand times more so. In Eugland, whose parliamentary discussions are justly held up as a model of dignity and strength which our own congressional and legislative bodies might imitate with great advantage, the virulence, coarseness and vindictiveness of party always have surpassed any brutalities ever recorded in the political annals of America. Neither men nor women are spared in the political contests of Great Britain. We justly hold in this country that the journalist who could be tempted to reflect in the most distant manner upon a woman is a blackguard too detestable and irredeemable to be countenanced in the lowest grades of civilized life .-And, at this moment, in the most abusive and passionate contests of the press in New York and other large cities, when there seems nothing too hard for the disputants to say of each other, and where they speak without any fear of personal responsibility, we have never yet seen a discourteous allusion to woman, whose sex throws about her a panoply, which the most vindictive and violent respect. We know of no fact which more clearly shows that, personal and abusive as the party contests of America may be, there is infinitely more refinement and chivalry among our political gladiators than in Great Britain, where there never have been any scruples about attacking the character of any woman, from the Queen to the lowest subject, and sometimes from rulning it for ever, whenever a political enemy could be injured, or a political purpose gained thereby.
