DEFEAT OF THE FEDERALS AT MURFREESBORO.

FROM VICKSBURG. The daring exploit of the iron-clad steamer Arkansas on the Mississippi, has thrown around the war of the Federal fleet, and has given encouragement to the gallant troops who are now successfully defending Vicksburg. The only intelligence received from that point yesterday is contained in the following dispatch to the Secretary of the Navy, from Gen. Earl Van Dorn:

RECEIVED LAST NIGHT A COPY OF THE NEW YORK HERALD OF THE 13TH INST. THE PAPER CONTAINS AN ACCOUNT OF THE CAPTURE OF MURFREESBORO, TENN., BY THE CONFEDERATES, WITH \$200,000 WORTH OF ARMY SUPPLIES. THE FOLLOWING IS THE DISPATCH ANNOUNCING THE DEFEAT:

NASHVILLE, July 14th, 1862. The Union forces engaged were the Third Mississippi, Col. Leslie, eight hundred men; the Sixth Mississippi, Col. Parkhurst, three hundred; the Pennsylvania, Col. Smith, two hundred and twenty-five; the Seventh, two hundred and twenty-five; the Fourth Kentucky, six hundred; and the Twenty-fourth Tennessee, five hundred men.
