LATEST FROM GENERAL BRAG. [FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.] DALTON, Ga., Nov. 27th, 1863.—The army reached Ringgold last night without molestation.

We lost all the wagons of one division except those of Gen. Wright's brigade upon Dalton. The head of the column has just arrived. Heavy marching in the night.

All the railroad stock at Chickamauga was saved. The cars could not be moved, but were destroyed.

The people along the road are suffering with the army. Nearly everybody has fled. The wagon roads are in a horrible condition.

Among the killed at Missionary Ridge, Nov. 27, were: Col. Forchuck, of South Carolina; McClellan, of Georgia; and Bullock, of Tennessee, were wounded.
