LOCAL MATTERS.

CHARGED WITH BUYING GREENBACKS.

Before Commissioner William F. Watson the case of Mrs. Nathalie Dowell was again taken up yesterday. It will be remembered that she was charged with trading in greenbacks. Mrs. Dowell appeared, closely veiled, and at times during the examination seemed deeply humiliated at the position in which she was placed, several times weeping bitterly, and at others indignantly denying certain allegations against her.

The Commissioner conceded the point, and remarked that he thought the case an exceedingly trifling one; but, nevertheless, it had been shown that Mrs. Dowell had obtained these funds, and the statutes of Congress, therefore, left him no other alternative than to refer the settlement of the matter to Judge Halyburton.

While he was confident that no grand jury could bring in a true bill against the accused, yet it would be a usurpation of his privilege to discharge her, and he was, therefore, compelled to send her on for examination. She was bailed for her appearance in the sum of one thousand dollars, and thereupon left the Commissioner's office.

HUSTINGS COURT.—The Hustings Court of Magistrates disposed of the following business yesterday:

Frank Morris, alias Hermann, was arraigned on the charge of murdering and robbing Michael Rourke, and the Court, being of opinion that the evidence against the prisoner was of a decided character, sent him on for trial before Judge Lyons.

Malissa J. Parmature, charged with stealing two hundred dollars in Confederate notes from Bickerton W. Saunders, was also sent on for trial.

Aner, slave of Francis Gathright, charged with burglariously entering, in the night time, the house of William Palmer, and stealing therefrom six thousand dollars' worth of silverware, provisions, etc., was ordered to be sold beyond the limits of the Commonwealth.

MAYOR'S COURT.—Among the cases disposed of by the Mayor yesterday we cite the following:

James M. Munday, member of Ninth Virginia cavalry, charged with disorderly conduct in the street, and drawing a pistol on the watch, was held to security for his good behavior.

The case of Ned, slave of Turpin & Yarbrough, charged with conniving at the escape of Lucy Ann, slave of A. Wolf, was called; but, for reasons which actuated previous postponements, the case was again committed till a future day.

Elizabeth, a slave, charged with receiving a lot of bacon which was stolen from James R. Childs some time last spring, was ordered to be whipped.

Several parties were fined for permitting waste water to escape from their hydrants, thereby creating a nuisance.

RETURN OF PRISONERS.—Between eight hundred and one thousand Confederate prisoners, who have been confined in Northern bastilles, arrived in this city yesterday afternoon.

They reached City Point by flag-of-truce boat on Saturday last; but, in consequence of the heavy ice in James river, could not get to Richmond before. An equal number of Yankee prisoners will leave Rocketts this morning, from whence they will be taken to Varina, and then be transferred to the Federal flag-of-truce steamer in waiting to take them to Fortress Monroe.

COMMITTED TO CASTLE THUNDER.—The following parties, charged with being deserters and general robbers, were sent down to this city yesterday by Major McLean, the provost-marshal at Goldsboro', North Carolina.

They were subsequently imprisoned in Castle Thunder by order of the Provost-Marshal of this place:

W. B. Herald and William Frick, members of the Twelfth Tennessee cavalry; James Isom, Twenty-eighth Virginia regiment; Ellis Kirby, Jesse Kirby, William Carson, W. A. Chappell, Ireddell Kirby, Warner Rector, David Edwards, W. Tuttle, B. Bruncock, K. Kirby and Eliza Lowe, J. Carson, Thirty-seventh Virginia battalion of cavalry; T. Brumme and Creid South, Eighth Virginia cavalry; and Willy Todd, member of Colonel Preston's Virginia reserves.

ROBBERY.—Some time during Tuesday night the store-house of Captain John H. Tomlinson, on Main street, below Thirty-second (Rocketts), was broken into and robbed of two barrels of flour, six or seven hundred pounds of bacon, a lot of sugar, lard, etc., amounting in value to upwards of six thousand dollars. The rogues were very daring in their depredations, breaking open the front door and taking everything out by that way.

THE ENEMY IN SOUTH CAROLINA.

Georgia papers of the 8th, which we received yesterday evening through the Southern Express Company, contain some particulars of Sherman's movements:

The Federals, on Thursday morning, were at Windsor, about fifteen miles from Aiken. It is not known in what force. No movements were made by them on Thursday. Cause of this not ascertained.

The troops in the vicinity of Windsor are Kilpatrick's corps.

It is reported that Generals Hampton and Wheeler engaged the enemy on the 7th and 8th, repulsing them at all points. Our loss about seventy killed, wounded and missing; that of the enemy much greater.

The enemy are reported to be moving towards the Congaree river.

A gentleman from Columbia states that Slocum's corps is moving on that city on this side of the Edisto. His main line, when last heard from, was on the railroad.

It is stated in Columbia that Kilpatrick's corps is protecting Slocum's left.

It is ascertained that Porter is again moving on Charleston. When last heard from he was at Green pond.

It is not known where General Sherman himself is.

Barnwell Courthouse was burned on Monday night.

The roads are teeming with vehicles, stock, and all kinds of movable property, fleeing for Georgia and Upper Carolina.
