LOCAL MATTERS.

CONFEDERATE STATES DISTRICT COURT. Before Judge John D. Halyburton, yesterday, the petition of Madison Phillips for discharge from service under a writ of habeas corpus was heard, and the Court agreeing to the prayer of the petitioner, he was thereupon discharged.

RICHMOND CIRCUIT COURT, YESTERDAY. Judge Meredith presiding.—In the matter of a petition for a writ of habeas corpus of Henderson Phillips, of Henry county, who sues for a discharge from service in company C, Fifty-seventh regiment Virginia infantry, on account of having been elected a justice of the peace for said county. The evidence in the case proving that he had been duly elected, and been duly qualified as such, the court decided that he was not liable to military duty, and thereupon ordered his discharge from said company C.

HUSTINGS COURT.—The fourth day's proceedings of the session of the Hustings Court of Magistrates will be found below:

Eliza, slave of Edward Stiff, charged with poisoning Augustus Kuper, son of Frederick Kuper, was discharged, the evidence being insufficient to warrant the detention of the accused.

Jas. E. Robinson and Thaddeus A. R. Hopkins, charged with stealing a watch from J. A. Lahite, were sent on for examination before Judge Lyons.

Wm. Clayton, charged with stealing two hundred and twenty dollars from Martha J. Crawford, was discharged.

David J. Childress, charged with aiding in the escape of a negro slave, was sent on for examination before the Hustings Court.

The Grand Jury brought in indictments against Francis Leidenmeyer, Jas. E. Robinson, John F. Chambers, Christian Bergin, J. H. Sherman, Henry Beckman, D. J. McCormack, F. W. Hagemeier and Christian Euker, charged with keeping drinking saloons, where liquor is sold without a license.

The Court will meet again at twelve o'clock this morning.

Mayor's Court.—The following is a summary of the proceedings in this court on yesterday:

A large number of negroes were arraigned before His Honor, charged with being in an unlawful assembly. Colonel Danforth appeared and stated that he had obtained from the Mayor a permit to have at his house an assemblage of negroes, not to exceed twenty; that when he came down stairs he found, by count, that there was over eighty there. Witness said there was a marriage going on; that the minister was there, and that the crowd collected gathered there after his conversation with the Mayor; when the police entered the house he was up stairs in bed. The Mayor reserved his decision.

Isabella Randall, free, was charged with stealing a skirt, a sheet and some clothing, valued at five hundred dollars, belonging to L. Sardine. Sent on to the Hustings Court.

Jerry Lynch, charged with stealing pigs from Jacob Freeman, striking A. Crowder, and being drunk on the street. Required to give three hundred dollars security to keep the peace, which he gave.

J. J. Sullivan, soldier, was charged with interfering with and resisting the police. Sent to the Provost-Marshal.

John, slave of Daniel DeJarnette, arrested with three pieces of bacon in his possession. Ordered to be whipped.

Peter Lawson, butcher, was charged with selling a beef shin for four pound weight, and it turning out that the same only weighed three pounds and a half, a fine was imposed.

Ned, slave of Turpin & Yarbrough, was sent on to the Hustings Court for conniving at and aiding in the escape from her owner of Lucy Ann, slave of A. Wolfe.

BEATING HIS WIFE.—Officer Charles H. Moore, a member of the city police, arrested, yesterday afternoon, Lieutenant John H. Reardon, charged with assaulting and beating his wife. He was committed to the upper station-house to answer the offence before the Mayor this morning.

ROBBERY.—On Thursday night, the storehouse of the Rev. John H. Ray, the editor of the Christian Advocate, was broken into and robbed of about three thousand dollars' worth of bacon, butter, lard and coffee. The thieves, in this case, effected an entrance through the front window and passed all their plunder through the back alley.

A substitute broker in Albany, New York, has returned \$15,000 to the provost-marshal for ten men who ran away after being enlisted.
