IMPORTANT CHANGE IN THE REGISTRATION LAW—HOW BOOKS ARE TO BE PURGED OF ILLEGAL VOTERS.—The following "Act to provide for the purging of registration books of illegal voters" has passed both houses of the General Assembly, and now goes to the Governor for his approval.

"1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly, That it shall be lawful for any five qualified voters of any election district, fifteen days previous to either of the regular days of registration, to post written or printed notices at not less than three public places in said district, including the voting precinct, of the names of the persons whose names are improperly on the registration books of that precinct. The notice shall be signed by the parties posting the same. On the regular day of registration it shall be the duty of the registrar to hear testimony produced for or against the right of persons named in the notice to be retained on the registration books; and if he shall be satisfied that any person mentioned in said notice has removed from the election district, or corporation, has died, or has been convicted of felony, or for any other reason, is not a qualified voter, he shall strike the said name from the registration books. From such decision of the registrar no appeal may be made; and the same shall be provided for in section four hundred, chapter seven of the Code, eighteen hundred and seventy-three. And the registrar shall immediately after the regular day of registration, post written or printed notice at the precinct, and at two other public places in the election district, of the names of the persons whose names are on the registration books. If the registrar should be unable to hear the evidence in reference to the names posted on the regular days of registration, the books may be kept open as to such names only, for four other days.

"2. This act shall be in force from its passage."

FARMERS' MILLS COMPANY.—Judge Turner, of the Twelfth circuit, has granted a charter of incorporation to the "Farmers' Mills Company," and a copy of the same has been received for record in the office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth. The object of the company is the manufacture of flour, meal, and its capital stock is to be not less than \$6,351 nor more than \$25,000, and will be divided into shares of \$100 each. The company has acquired by purchase about twenty acres of land near Woodstock, and will be entitled to purchase additional land, the whole not to exceed one hundred acres. The principal office is to be kept at Farmers' Mill, about five miles from Woodstock, in Shenandoah county. Officers for first year: President, Joseph Burner, of Woodstock; Treasurer, Isaac Richard, of Woodstock; and Secretary, William Borders, of A. Slaver, and Benjamin Harman.

COLONEL JOSEPH MAYO, JR., ADJUDGED TO BE AN INSANE.—The commission of magistrates, consisting of Police Justice White and Justices Clark and William Watts, appointed to inquire into the mental condition of Colonel Joseph Mayo, Jr., met in the Police Justice's office at 4:30 o'clock yesterday morning. The evidence, substantially the same which has been before reported, closed about 1 P. M., when the commission adjourned to meet at 11 o'clock to-morrow.

THE COMMISSIONER, after a personal examination of Colonel Mayo, declared him insane, and in due case of his conveyance to the nearest lunatic asylum as soon as his condition will permit his removal.

CORNER-STONE LAYING.—The corner-stone of the German Methodist chapel, on Leigh street, between Foshee and First streets, will be laid with the usual interesting Masonic ceremonies, under the direction of Rev. Lodge No. 51, of Masons, escorted by Richmond Commandery, No. 2, Knights Templar, on Monday afternoon, April 6th, at 4 o'clock. Addresses may be expected on the occasion by Rev. John E. Edwards and others.

PARDONS REFUSED.—The Governor has refused applications made for pardons in the case of William Booker, who was convicted of petit larceny in the Police Court of Richmond and sentenced to six months in jail, and in the case of Gabriel Banks, who was convicted in the same court of a like offense and sentenced to four months in jail.

PENALTY FOR FRAUDULENT BRANDING OF UNMANUFACTURED TOBACCO.—Both houses of the General Assembly have passed a bill providing for any person who, or permit to be used, on any hoghead or package of unmanufactured tobacco any brand or mark indicating the name of any person who neither raised nor sold said hoghead, he shall be fined ten dollars for each hoghead or package so falsified or branded, one-half of which fine is to go to the informer.

MURDERER REPRISED.—Susan Thornton, now lying in Charlotte county jail under sentence of death, which was to have been executed upon her for murder on the 10th of July, it having been represented to the Governor that she is about to become a mother.

CONVICTS RECEIVED.—Samuel and Philip Brown, of Warwick county, were received at the penitentiary yesterday under seven years' imprisonment each for grand larceny.

THE TOBACCO INTEREST.

Important Resolutions Adopted by the Exchange Yesterday.

AN EFFORT TO BREAK UP THE ORGANIZATION DEFEATED.

Mr. Ficklen moved to recommit the resolutions and amendments to the committee in order that the report might be put together and read connectedly. Withdrawn.

The third, fourth, and fifth resolutions were then agreed to, and fifth resolutions amended, was read by Mr. Gray and adopted as a whole by the meeting.

Mr. J. K. Childrey presented the following Resolved, That we abolish the Tobacco Exchange and that no person shall be a member thereof after May 1st.

Some gentleman moved to amend by adding: "And that we return to the old system of sales at the warehouses."

This resolution and amendment created great excitement and debate, but were finally defeated.

Mr. Yarbrough moved to adjourn until Monday on account of the absence of the regular secretary of the Association.

Mr. Christian moved to postpone the subject indefinitely.

Mr. Somerville wanted a little more time to consider the subject contained in the resolutions.

Mr. James A. Scott hoped that the question would not be dodged by any such motion as indefinite postponement, and with Mr. Somerville, however, that it might be well to postpone the subject until Monday.

Messrs. Christian and Yarbrough, at the solicitation of a number of gentlemen, then withdrew their motions, with the consent of the Exchange.

Mr. Cunningham then suggested that, in order to avoid any difficulty which might arise from a motion to call the roll on any question, as the secretary was absent and had the roll of members locked up, that each member present who voted be required to write his name upon the back of his ballot, the ballot to be retained by the secretary pro tempore in case any dispute should arise.

The report was then read, and the Chair announced that it was before the meeting for consideration. [The resolutions have already been published in the Dispatch.]

Mr. Scott moved to recommit the resolutions in order that the committee might modify their report.

Mr. Gray, president of the Exchange and chairman of the committee, stated that no delay would be necessary in view of the fact that the committee was prepared at once to present their modifications.

Mr. Yarbrough invited to preside by Mr. Gray, and the committee submitted the report as it had been modified.

The report as modified is as follows: Resolved, That the auctioneer shall allow no tobacco to be listed for inspection without written evidence that the tobacco is in the warehouse of the owner, and that when any tobacco is listed for inspection the name of the planter, reziper, or owner thereof shall be written in full in the list book, and also upon the label attached to the sample of each hoghead, tierce, or box.

Resolved, That the members of this association will hold the inspectors responsible for accepting of any tobacco, tierce, or box of tobacco; and the inspectors shall not permit any owner or agent of any owner of tobacco, under a penalty of \$100, to handle any sample of tobacco until the same is tied and sealed by the inspector. And any member of this association interfering with the warehouse of any member to pay a fine of \$100. And any buyer or seller who shall mutilate a sample by pulling the leaves therefrom, or make any alteration of a sample shall be subject to a fine of \$20. And it shall furthermore be the duty of any member of this association who is cognizant of wilful neglect, infidelity, or any other violation of the regulations of the Association, in his official duty to report the fact to this association, in order that he may be reported to the Executive of the State. It shall be the duty of the standing committee to enforce the collection of fines, and in case of refusal on the part of any member shall, by vote of the association, be expelled.

Resolved, In order to facilitate the warehouse operations, and that tobacco may be coopered and stowed away the same day on which it is sampled, commission merchants and inspectors may have their tobacco sampled the day previous to the day of selling; but inspectors shall not break tobacco out of turn as it is listed.

It shall be the duty of the standing committee to enforce the collection of fines, and in case of refusal on the part of any member shall, by vote of the association, be expelled.

Resolved, In order to facilitate the warehouse operations, and
