

North Carolina. THE EXPULSION OF MR. THORNE FROM THE LEGISLATURE. A few days ago we published the account of the expulsion of J. Williams Thorne from the House of Representatives of North Carolina.

House of Representatives. Raleigh, N. C., February 25, 1875. Major Moore: For the last four days the House of Representatives has been changed into a high ecclesiastical court to determine whether, on account of my religious opinions, I had a right to sit in the House.
