THE FIRST STEP TAKEN.

Circular from Board of Immigration.

PLAN FOR FURNISHING INFORMATION TO INTENDING SETTLERS.

The State Board of Immigration has prepared and will shortly issue the following circular as the first step towards discharging the duties imposed upon them by the act of the General Assembly for the encouragement of immigration, passed at the last session:

COMMONWEALTH OF VIRGINIA. OFFICE OF STATE BOARD OF IMMIGRATION. RICHMOND, JULY 1, 1875.

The undersigned State Board of Immigration, constituted by an act of the General Assembly approved March 2, 1875, desiring to carry into effect the object contemplated in said act, have caused to be prepared the accompanying forms, containing questions to be answered and obligations to be assumed by such persons as desire to avail themselves of the benefits of the act in making sale of their lands.

As soon as the Board is prepared to make appointments a local agent will be designated for each county or corporation throughout the Commonwealth, and every thing possible to attend to the general interests of the immigrant, to furnish him or her with all needed information, and to facilitate him in reaching any particular tract of land in his county which he may desire to examine.
