BOARD OF ALDERMEN

A LEVEL SESSION LAST EVENING—RESOLUTIONS FROM STANDING COMMITTEES—SOMETHING ABOUT THE CLARKE SPRING PROPERTY—A LITTLE BUSYING ABOUT THE BOARD—A TABLE—HOW THE MATTER WAS SETTLED—ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS APPLICABLE FOR STREET IMPROVEMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held yesterday afternoon. Present at roll call: Mr. John A. Meredith (president), in the chair; Messrs. Bass, Beall, Carrington, Foster, Kellam, Scott, Smith, Tanner, Todd, Wagner, Williams, and Zimmer. The Mayor was absent.

The Mayor's report was read and approved. The Mayor stated that he had received a communication from the Mayor of Boston, requesting the aid of the City of Richmond in the construction of a monument to the soldiers of the Commonwealth who fell in the late war.

Mr. Carrington moved to suspend the rule requiring the reference of the resolution to the Finance Committee. Agreed to—yeas, 12; noes, 4.

Mr. Carrington moved to amend the resolution transferring one hundred and eighty dollars from the account of salaries of fire department to expense account of same department. Agreed to under a suspension of the rules.
