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YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION.—A meeting of the directory of this Association was held at Association Hall yesterday afternoon at 6 o'clock.—J. Taylor Edson, president, in the chair; C. P. Rddy, secretary.

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HORSE STOLEN.—On Wednesday night between 12 o'clock and daybreak the stable of Mr. George C. Peace, in the lower portion of Hanover, was entered, and a fine red-roan horse carried away. Mr. Peace suspects a man whom he had in his employ, and was missing the same morning that the horse disappeared. The thief also carried off two suits of clothes and five dollars in money. Mr. Peace came to the city on yesterday and placed the case in the hands of Detective John Wren.

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CHANGE OF SCHEDULE ON THE RICHMOND AND PETERSBURG ROAD.—In order to connect with the trains to and from the North the Richmond and Petersburg railroad announce this morning the following new schedule—viz.: Through mail train for the South leaves Richmond at 8 A. M. daily, with passenger-car attached, and reaches Norfolk at 1:15 P. M. Freight train, with passenger-car attached, leaves Richmond daily (except on Sunday) at 9 A. M. Passengers for Lynchburg may take this train, making close connection at Petersburg. A freight train, with passenger-car attached, will leave at 5:10 P. M. daily (except on Sunday), instead of 5:10 P. M. as heretofore.

THE OLD DOMINION CLUB'S BANNER.—Yesterday afternoon the Old Dominion Club of Jefferson Ward spread a handsome red banner to the breeze, the banner being unfurled from a rope stretched across Main street from the club-rooms. The flag is fifteen by eight feet, and bears the names of Tilden, Hendricks, and Walker. The Old Dominion is one of the oldest, most useful, and enterprising clubs in the city.

UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURT, THURSDAY.—Judge Hughes presiding.—In the matter of G. H. Dillard, Nathan Parker, a creditor, was authorized to prosecute a suit in the Circuit Court of Essex county to enforce the bankruptcy of said Dillard and Parker. The assignee was also directed to collect all the bankrupt's choses in action that are collectible, and sell the balance at public auction. The order of September 25th last was revoked. Upon the petition of the bankrupt it was further ordered that the assignee show cause on the 10th inst. why the bankrupt should not be allowed a homestead exemption; and if no cause is shown the bankrupt is authorized to purchase at the sale of his goods to the amount of his exemption.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE UNITED STATES CIRCUIT COURT YESTERDAY.—Judge Edson presiding.—The following cases were disposed of: Joseph Stukenberg, who was found guilty on Wednesday of violations of the United States revenue laws, was sentenced to five dollars fine and imprisonment for three months.

In the case of the Petersburg Railroad Company for alleged internal revenue violations, verdict was rendered for defendant. Judgment was rendered against Hon. Joseph Segar, one of the securities of Captain A. W. Reynolds, late quartermaster United States Army, for \$10,000.

In the case of the Petersburg Railroad Company, charged with carrying an empty whiskey cask from which the internal revenue stamp had not been erased, a verdict was found for the defendant.

Judgment was also given against Hamilton C. East and J. B. Royster, securities for the official bond of William James, late collector of internal revenue.

CASES DISPOSED OF.—In the Hustings Court yesterday the following cases were disposed of: Margaret Killgallon, charged with procuring a license. Nolle prosequi.

John Brooks, Antonio Petrie, and Mary Harris, charged with misdemeanor. Acquitted.

Martha Russell and Roberta Russell, charged with disturbing the congregation of Navy Hill Free-Will Baptist church. Acquitted.

Jane Hungerford, charged with keeping a disorderly and ill-governed house, was tried and acquitted.

POLICE COURT, THURSDAY.—The following cases were disposed of in this court yesterday by Police-Justice J. J. White: Sam. Duncan, charged with assaulting and beating Charley Robinson, was dismissed on payment of cost.

Henry Robertson, charged with stealing a picture valued at \$3 from Mr. George W. Davis, was sent on to the next term of the grand jury, this being his second offence of petit larceny.

Selessa King, charged with throwing brick in the street and being otherwise disorderly, was fined \$5 and costs.

Walker H. Brook, charged with assaulting J. W. Gaines, was fined \$3.

Augustus Clay and George Walker, charged with wounding George Bickerton, Clay was discharged, and Walker sent to the grand jury.
