WEATHER REPORT: INDICATIONS FOR TO-DAY.—Washington, January 26.—For the South Atlantic States, lower barometer, southerly to westerly wind, and warmer, partly cloudy weather.

Mr. Lawrence Jerome Dazzles the Grand Jury with a Burst of Eloquence. The New York World says that Mr. Lawrence J. Jerome yesterday secured for the grand jury at a great expense of subterfuge and watchfulness. Several gentlemen from the District Attorney's made him swear, and then the grand jury, through its foreman, Mr. Cortland D. Field, intimated that if he knew anything about the alleged May-Bennett case, there was his opportunity.

PROBABLE FATAL ILLNESS OF MR. F. W. HANNEWINKEL.—At 2 o'clock yesterday morning Mr. Fred. William Hannewinkel, consul for the German and Austrian empires, and a large exporter of leaf tobacco here, was stricken with paralysis on the left side. He attended the Mozart musical on the evening before and seemed to be in good health till suddenly and terribly attacked, as stated. In a few hours he became unconscious, and his condition grew from worse to worse, till at 12 o'clock last night no hope of his recovery was entertained.

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INSURANCE LAW.

IMPORTANT AND INTERESTING DECISION RENDERED BY JUDGE BURKS IN THE SUPREME COURT ON THURSDAY IN THE CASE OF GEORGIA HOME VS. KENNEDY.

The following are the main points in the decision of Judge Burks rendered Thursday in the Supreme Court in an insurance case that has attracted considerable attention. The opinion was concurred in by all the other judges except Moncure, who dissented mainly on the ground that the facts in the case, as certified by the court below, did not, in his opinion, warrant the verdict of the jury.
