WEATHER REPORT.

INDICATIONS FOR TO-DAY.—For the Middle Atlantic States, generally higher pressure, diminishing northerly winds, cooler, threatening, and rainy weather, followed by warmer, clear, or partly cloudy weather.

For the South Atlantic and East Gulf States, generally high pressure, slightly lower, or nearly stationary, temperature, and light to moderate easterly winds, or partly cloudy weather will prevail, with probably occasional light east rains.

Cautionary signals continue at Wilmington, Smithville, Cape Lookout, Cape Hatteras, Kitty Hawk, Cape Henry, Norfolk, Cape May, Atlantic City, Barnegat, New Haven, Woods Hole, Boston, Portland, and Eastport.

LOCAL MATTERS.

INTERESTING MEETING LAST NIGHT AT BROAD-STREET METHODIST CHURCH.—REPORT OF THE DELEGATES TO THE METHODIST GENERAL CONFERENCE.

The exercises opened with prayer by Rev. R. L. Jenkins, of Trinity church, and were continued by Rev. Dr. Sledd, of Centenary church; Rev. J. J. Lafferty, of the Christian Advocate; and Rev. Dr. John E. Edwards, of Park-Place church.

There was no attempt at oratory by any of the speakers, but it was very interesting and entertaining, the audience being at times provoked to laughter as the speakers would relate some of the humorous incidents that came under their observation.

Each of the speakers gave brief but very comprehensive reports of the work accomplished by the Conference.

The plan of the Conference delivered by the fraternal delegates was vivid and intensely interesting. It was stated that much good had been accomplished for the Church, and that it was to-day as solid in its foundation as the rock amid the ocean's billows.

The publishing interests, the mission and Sabbath-school work, were all alluded to.

The Conference was eminently conservative, not disposed to recede from old landmarks or to make innovations, and was more remarkable for what it did not do than for what it did do.

It was inexpedient, and in its opinion unnecessary, to hold a special convention to be held in Richmond, Va., on the 15th of July.

Hundreds of resolutions, memorials, and petitions from all sections were rejected, and the Conference might be called with safety "a non-concurring one."

Dr. Edwards gave a brief review of the successive General Conferences from the first held in New York, in 1840, to the present time, and it was conceded that this last was not behind its predecessors in ability, piety, or usefulness.

Allusion was also made at the failure of the Conference to elect a bishop, which did not seem to be a matter of regret, to the few slight changes proposed, and to the satisfactory answers.

The meeting was one of the most pleasant and profitable ever held in Broad-Street church.

At the conclusion of the addresses, on motion of Rev. Mr. Steel, pastor of the church, a rising vote of thanks was tendered to the speakers, after which the congregation were dismissed by singing the doxology and with the benediction.

THE WHEAT CROP.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION ON THE SUBJECT FURNISHED BY THE SOUTHERN FERTILIZING COMPANY.

The following letters nobly supplement the reports published by us yesterday:

TOWER HILL, May 29.—The wheat has improved very much in the last few days, and the crop of straw is likely to be tolerably fair.

POST ROAD, May 29.—I think there will be, certainly, one half, and if the season from now till harvest be very propitious, two thirds of the usual crop made in this section.

COLES FERRY, May 28.—The wheat crop of my neighborhood promises rather more than an average yield, but my information is confined to a limited area, and does not extend beyond a radius of, say, ten miles.

In reference to the tobacco crop, I would say that not more than half an average one will be planted in the same area, in consequence of the almost unexampled destruction of the plant by the fly.

RAVENSWORTH, May 30.—The wheat is undoubtedly injured by the rust on blade coming so early. I hope, however, with propitious weather that it will be harvested.

NORTHSIDE P. O., May 30.—Ten days ago the wheat crop was thought almost to be an entire failure. Many farmers were of the opinion that they would not make seed.
