Yellow-Fever.—A Suggestion. Allow me a short space in your paper for a suggestion. While the yellow-fever is desolating our cities of the South, of course everything that our profession is cognizant of which it would be supposed could diminish its fatality, as disinfectants, fumigations, &c., the passage of the atmosphere, &c., have been tried, I would suggest the use of the bromo-chlorum in the following manner: Have light frames made to fit the windows of the sick-room, and over these frames tack gauze or muslin to the window-frame. This gauze should be kept constantly wet with a solution of the strength say of one quart of chlorum to two or even three gallons of water. The powerful deodorizing and truly disinfecting qualities will be seen in the prescription. The great trouble of having the sick in these yellow-fever cases in an unventilated atmosphere (for you may ventilate the room and use every hygienic means known to keep the rooms pure) is an impure entering them, and the bromo-chlorum, and let the air, through the bromo-chlorum.
