WASHINGTON, May 27.—Again was the morning hour consumed in dilatory motions and roll-calls, and again the bill to prohibit the removal of cases from the State Federal courts went over.

LOSSES OF SPIRITS BY LEAKAGE.

The Senate Finance Committee to-day resumed the consideration of Mr. Voorhees's bill, which proposes to authorize allowances for losses of spirits by leakage or unavoidable accidents during their transportation from distillery warehouses for exportation.

The House, without a dissenting voice, to-day agreed to take the Senate yellow-fever bill from the Speaker's table and substitute it, at the instance of the Yellow-Fever Committee, for the House bill on the same subject, which was the order of the day.

THE CHIEF-JUSTICE OF TEXAS.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Senators McDonald, Bayard, and Conkling, as a sub-committee of the Senate Judiciary Committee, to-day heard Mr. D. T. Corbin, and several witnesses who appeared at his request, in rebuttal of the charges made against him with a view to defeating his confirmation as Chief Justice of the United States Court of that Territory.

CAPTAIN EADS'S LAST INSTALLMENT.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—In the Cabinet to-day the Attorney-General rendered an opinion, holding that Captain Eads is entitled to the final installment of \$500,000 claimed by him on the jetty contract, and the Secretary of War has ordered payment to be made.
