

We thank the Dispatch for its complimentary criticism. Our only rule in grammar is to express our thoughts in the clearest, simplest, and shortest manner.

Again, the sentence may be defended on another ground. Conceding that to compare it, the term "other" is required, would not every reader, knowing Broadus, would not every reader, readily and certainly find the allusion?

Our main defence of the sentence, however, is that it plainly, accurately, and concisely expresses our thought, and the word "other" adds nothing to its clearness and force.

We acknowledge the Dispatch as high, but not infallible, authority in questions of grammar. Senior Editor Herald-Religious Herald.

We should like to convince our venerable confidant not of our infallibility but of the infallibility of the rules of grammar. They, like the common law, are "the perfection of human reason."

The Herald's remarks as to "the ellipsis" we need not notice at length. We are sorry for the institution which has a professor (if he is professor of English) who teaches that the word "other" could correctly be omitted from the sentence under consideration.

Let us illustrate our main point. Dr. JETER could correctly say: "I like wine better than any kind of food."

But he could not correctly say: "I like wine better than any kind of liquor." This latter sentence should read: "I like wine better than any other kind of liquor."

So if Broadus had been a lawyer our venerable friend might write: "I liked Broadus better than any other preacher."

But as Broadus was a preacher, he cannot correctly word his sentence in that way. He must write: "I liked Broadus better than any other preacher."

"In gestures Broadus excelled any preacher that I have known." This is an equivalent to saying: "In gestures Broadus excelled Broadus himself."

Because the words "any preacher" (to quote GOOD BROWN) include and describe Broadus himself, as our venerable friend may perceive as it will write: "Broadus excelled in gestures all other preachers."

When he means only that "Broadus excelled in gestures all other preachers," he should say: "Broadus excelled in gestures all other preachers."

So we must beg leave to insist that the sentence in question failed to "express plainly, accurately, and concisely" Dr. JETER's thought. In our opinion, it did not express that thought at all.

The word "other" would introduce a new idea into the sentence, viz., that Broadus was a preacher. The sentence as it stands conveys the idea that he was not a preacher.

Just so, Broadus was a preacher. The sentence as it stands conveys the idea that he was not a preacher. Therefore it is inaccurate. But add the word "other," and the sentence becomes correct and tells the whole truth—that Broadus was a preacher who excelled all other preachers in gestures.

Let us try one more illustration. What would Dr. JETER think of this sentence: "Broadus was a greater preacher than any preacher." This is a sentence that would be grammatically correct; if the word "other" were put into it; as Broadus was a greater preacher than any other preacher.

Demosthenes was a greater orator than any orator. We guess that Dr. JETER will say that these sentences are absurd; yet grammatically they are identical with the one under consideration. Either of them would still be awkward, but would be grammatically correct; if the word "other" were put into it; as Broadus was a greater preacher than any other preacher.

In this sentence the writer acknowledged himself a sinner. Instead of saying, as he tried to say, that his opponent was one. So in the first of the sentences quoted above, Dr. JETER says that he was converted when he meant to say that CORNELIUS and his family were converted.
