Chronicles, xxxiii., 33; xxxiii., 1-13, November 12, "A Man Prospered Beyond Precedent but Unsatisfied," Ecclesiastes ii., 11; John iv., 13, 14, November 13, "The Young Man's Success in Business," Genesis xxxix., 1-6, 29, 23, November 14, "A Highly-Favored Man and His Terrible End," Matthew x., 1-4; Luke xxii., 3-6, 47, 48; Matthew xxvii., 3-5; Acts i., 16-20, November 15, "Opposite Choices of Two Young Men," II. Timothy, ii., 19, 20, 21.
