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CITY COUNCIL.

An Effort to Secure a Joint Meeting of the Two Bodies Failed—Meeting of the Common Council—Street Improvements—Water—Small-Pox Hospital—Claims Paid—The Yorktown Centennial—Lee Monument—New Business, &c., &c.

JOINT MEETING. A meeting of the two branches of the City Council, called for 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon, was held at half-past 6 o'clock...

STREETS. Mr. Curtis, from the Committee on Streets, presented resolutions appropriating \$5,000 for the improvement of the streets...

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Mayor Carrington and Mr. L. F. Bossieux also made addresses in the same line, Mayor Carrington assuring the Council that unless they place the City of Richmond in funds sufficient to properly discharge the duty to which they were called by the Council the organization would be forthwith dissolved.

REPORT OF THE CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE OF THE COUNCIL WAS Laid on the table. A report from the Finance Committee, recommending an appropriation of \$5,000 to the Citizens' Association was taken up, and a motion to increase the appropriation to \$15,000 was rejected by the following vote—two thirds.

AYES—Messrs. Campbell, Cole, Curtis, Davis of Marshall Ward, Ellett, Ferguson, Harwood, Hayes, Higgins, McDaniel, and Weisiger—12.

NOES—Messrs. Davis of Madison Ward, Gunn of Marshall Ward, King, Pizzini, Pizzini, Warren, and Weisiger—10.

THE SUBJECT WAS DISCUSSED AT CONSIDERABLE LENGTH. Mr. Taylor moved to insert \$10,000. Lost—ayes, 13; noes, 7—not two thirds.

THE APPROPRIATION OF \$5,000 TO THE CITIZENS' ASSOCIATION WAS REJECTED—AYES, 16; NOES, NOT TWO THIRDS.

THE REPORT FROM THE CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE OF THE COUNCIL RECOMMENDING AN APPROPRIATION OF \$5,000, TO BE EXPENDED BY THE COUNCIL COMMITTEE, WAS THEN TAKEN UP.

MR. TAYLOR MOVED TO STRIKE OUT \$5,000 AND INSERT \$10,000. Lost—ayes, 13; noes, 7.

THE QUESTION WAS THEN TAKEN ON THE ORIGINAL PROPOSITION TO GIVE THE COUNCIL CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE \$5,000, AND IT WAS DEFEATED BY THE FOLLOWING VOTE:

NOES—Messrs. Cole, Davis of Marshall Ward, Forrester, and Higgins—4.

MR. TAYLOR PRESENTED TO THE COUNCIL A COMMITTEE REPORT FROM THE LEADER IN MONUMENT COMMITTEE ASKING THE CONTRIBUTION OF A LOT OR SITE UPON WHICH TO ERECT THE MONUMENT, &c.

MR. TAYLOR ASKED THAT A SPECIAL COMMITTEE BE APPOINTED, TO WHOM THIS PAPER SHALL BE REFERRED.

MR. TAYLOR SUGGESTED THAT THE PAPER BE REFERRED TO A SELECT COMMITTEE OF FIVE—THREE FROM THE COMMON COUNCIL AND TWO FROM THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN. AGREED TO.

THE CHAIR APPOINTED MESSRS. TAYLOR, WARREN, AND HIGGINS.

THE CHAIR ALSO REAPPOINTED THE PRESENT COMMITTEE ON THE IMPROVEMENT OF JAMES RIVER FOR THE ENSUING TERM.

VARIOUS RESOLUTIONS, ETC., FROM THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN WERE CONCURRED IN, AMONG THEM A RESOLUTION FOR RECESS TO OCTOBER 1ST.

RESOLUTIONS, &c. By Mr. Taylor: A resolution that the Committee on Grounds and Buildings take into consideration the propriety of fixing the pay of superintendents of parks same as pay of city police, &c. Referred.

By Mr. Phillips: A resolution to enlarge sewer inlets on Main street between Fifteenth and Seventeenth streets. Referred.

By Mr. T. Wiley Davis: Petition of William H. Woody for damages to his property on Venable street near Twenty-fifth street, caused by street grading. Referred to the Committee on Streets and Finance.

By Mr. Taylor: Petition of the Olympic Boat Club for the removal of rock in front of their boat-house. Referred to James River Improvement Committee.

By same: Petition of Company "C," Second of the Commonwealth, for reduction of gas-bills, &c. Referred to Committee on Light.

By Mr. T. Wiley Davis: A resolution requesting the committee to whom was referred the application of certain city employes for a restoration of their pay, to report at the first regular meeting of Council after recess. Agreed to.

ADJOURNED TILL OCTOBER. THE NEW FIRST-REGIMENT ARMOY.—The Committee on Grounds and Buildings met in the City Engineer's office yesterday afternoon to select plans for the armory building. The plan adopted by the committee was designed by B. J. Black, Esq., architect, and the building will be pushed forward to completion so as to be ready for occupancy by the 10th day of October next.

THE BUILDING WILL BE A TWO-STORY, covering the entire lot, 97 by 127. On the first floor are ten company-rooms and two offices for the colonel and staff. The main entrance opens into a large vestibule, 18 by 50, in which are the eight-foot stair-cases, store-rooms, wash-rooms and closets. Over the entrance is a circular balcony, around the drill-room will be arranged galleries for visitors, reached by two flights of stairs from the second-story vestibule. On this floor are also two private parlors, one at the front entrance there will be a musicians' balcony, above which will be placed the Virginia coat-of-arms. There will also be a basement-story under about one third of the building, in which will be placed the steam-heating apparatus, fuel-rooms, wash-rooms and closets. Over the main roof are two ventilating sky-lights 10 by 20 each. The exterior presents a very handsome appearance. The outer angle has a square belfry and flag-tower, and two of the other angles of the building have each an octagonal watch-tower, pierced with port-holes, which commands all sides of the building. These towers are all finished with battlements, the exterior to be stuccoed. When completed it will be one of the many buildings our city may be proud of.

THE COMMITTEE ON STREETS ALSO PRESENTED AN ORDINANCE TO REMOVE ALL TELEGRAPH-POLES FROM MAIN STREET WITHIN THIRTY DAYS, &c. ADOPTED.

RAILROAD CONNECTIONS. Mr. Curtis, from the Committee on Streets, presented an ordinance to amend the charter of the Richmond and Petersburg railroad and make certain track connections, &c. ADOPTED.

TELEGRAPH-POLES. The Committee on Streets also presented an ordinance to remove all telegraph-poles from Main street within thirty days, &c. ADOPTED.

CULVERT BONDS. Mr. Ellett presented a resolution appropriating \$20,000 in per cent. bonds for the extension and construction of culverts. ADOPTED.

PHYSICIAN TO THE SMALL-POX HOSPITAL. Mr. Pizzini, from the Committee on Relief of the Poor, presented a communication from Mr. Charles P. Bigger, Superintendent of the Small-Pox Hospital, recommending that there shall be a physician other than the almshouse physician, who shall have charge of the small-pox hospital. This Mr. Bigger suggested in order to protect the inmates of the almshouse from the disease.

MR. PIZZINI ALSO PRESENTED A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE COMMITTEE ON HEALTH TO EMPLOY A PHYSICIAN TO RESIDE AT THE HOSPITAL DURING THE PREVALENCE OF THE DISEASE AT A SALARY OF \$150 PER MONTH. THE RESOLUTION WAS DISCUSSED AT GREAT LENGTH, AND FINALLY ADOPTED BY THE FOLLOWING VOTE: AYES, 13; NOES, 7—NOT TWO THIRDS.

CHARTER GRANTED TO THE RICHMOND ELEVATOR COMPANY.

Judge Wellford, of the City Circuit Court, yesterday granted a charter to the Richmond Elevator Company. The objects for which this company has been formed are to elevate and transfer grain and other property, whether owned by said company or by other parties, from cars, wagons, or carriages, boats, barges, or vessels, into store-houses, warehouses, mills, cars, wagons, or carriages, boats, barges, or vessels, and vice versa; and also to warehouse, weigh, clean, and store grain and other property, whether owned by said company or by other parties; and to erect, buy, or lease necessary and suitable elevators, buildings, and machinery therefor; and to charge and collect such rates and prices for elevating, transferring, warehousing, weighing, cleaning, and storing, or any or either thereof, as said company shall from time to time adopt; and to contract generally with other business as may be connected therewith.

THE CAPITAL STOCK TO BE NOT LESS THAN \$50,000 MORE THAN \$1,000,000, DIVIDED INTO SHARES OF \$100 EACH. THE REAL ESTATE PROPOSED TO BE HELD IS FOR SUCH ELEVATORS, WAREHOUSES, STOREHOUSES, AND BUILDINGS, HEREIN BEFORE MENTIONED, AS MAY BE FOUND NECESSARY, NOT EXCEEDING TEN ACRES.

THE CITY OF RICHMOND WILL BE THE PLACE IN WHICH THE PRINCIPAL OFFICE WILL BE KEPT AND THE CHIEF BUSINESS TRANSACTED. THE NAMES OF THE OFFICERS OF THE COMPANY FOR THE FIRST YEAR are as follows: President, L. L. Bass; Secretary, C. Edward Buck; Directors: Thomas W. McCaune, John P. Branch, A. S. Buford, L. L. Bass, W. J. Johnson, and B. S. Fitch. All of them reside in Richmond.

HUSTINGS COURT.—The Hustings Court was engaged yesterday in trying the case of Leander Ferrara, charged with keeping a disorderly and ill-governed house. The jury returned a verdict of "guilty," and sentence will be passed by the Court this morning.

MANCHESTER AND VICINITY. Runaway in Chesterfield.—Wednesday evening a horse attached to a buggy belonging to Dr. Dorsett, of Powhatan county, ran away on the Midlothian place about nine miles from Manchester. Dr. Dorsett came down from Powhatan to attend a patient at Mr. John P. Sampson's residence, and while in the house his daughter, Miss Emily Dorsett, in the buggy, just as she came out the horse suddenly started at a rapid rate, and after going about one hundred yards upset the vehicle. Miss Dorsett was caught underneath the buggy and painfully injured. She was taken back to her home, where she received medical treatment at the hands of her father. The young lady exhibited great coolness and presence of mind, and would no doubt have succeeded in stopping the runaway team without any damage being sustained but for the fact that the vehicle struck against a small tree and was overturned. The buggy was completely demolished.
