

EFFORT AT RECONCILIATION. THE STRIKERS MAKE A MOVE IN THAT DIRECTION.

They Want to Know Upon What Terms They will be Taken Back, but Meet with an Unsatisfactory Reception.

BALTIMORE, Md., August 15.—All the members of the late Board of Fire Commissioners who were presented by the grand jury on Monday for malfeasance in office, except Samuel W. Register, who was president of the board, and is now out of the city, are to stand trial before the grand jury in St. Francis to attend the removal of Knights Templar in that city, appeared in court to-day in person or by counsel, and gave bail in \$3,000 each for their appearance when required. The excitement caused by presentments has not abated, and the grand jury is expected to be ready to begin its work on Wednesday following. United States bonds were sold in the one hundred and twenty-first report of the Treasury Department, in Washington, to the amount of five million dollars without relate of interest.

By telegraph to the Dispatch. ST. LOUIS, August 15.—About sixty shoelast-makers, employed by six manufacturers, have struck for higher wages. About 300 other workmen are thrown out of employment by the action of the last-makers. One manufacturer declared to the demands of the men, but the others show no disposition to do so.

NORFOLK, Va., August 15.—The drought which has existed in this section for many weeks, to the injury of the farming interests, was ended to-day by a copious and continued rainfall, lasting all day, and extending to Raleigh, N. C., and causing great relief to the people.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., August 15.—A special to the Times-Flag from Jacksonville, Fla., says that the bark Frithoff, the bark Hansen, lumber-laden, from Pasquaqua to Tonberg, went on the north on the 13th of August. The bark was brought about by outside private speculations of Frederick S. Stedman, Jr., partner of the firm, during his father's absence, and without his knowledge or consent he took securities amounting to two hundred and fifty thousand dollars with Cecil Ward & Co. The losses sustained by the young man are very heavy. When Mr. Stedman, Sr., returned to his office on Monday, after a short absence, he was made acquainted with the fact, and immediately closed up all obligations in the stock exchange, and after examining into the affairs of the concern thought it best to make an assignment to John McGinnis, Jr., of the Stock Exchange. The liabilities of the firm will amount to about \$600,000. Some of the securities deposited by Frederick S. Stedman, Jr., were covered by Fredrick S. Stedman, Jr., and Cecil Ward & Co., and were today offered as payment by many of his friends to continue business, but he thought it best to make an assignment. He has been a member of the Stock Exchange since its organization, and has passed through all the trying times of Wall street without difficulty.

By telegraph to the Dispatch. BALTIMORE, August 15.—Yesterday morning the wife of Edward J. Curry, a carpenter residing in the northwestern section of the city, was found dead in bed and her husband reported when he awoke in the morning that he found his wife dead lying by his side, and that she had died of heart-disease. The coroner, to whom the case had been reported, after hearing Curry's statement, thought an inquest unnecessary. Subsequently the neighbors reported that Curry had been in the habit of beating his wife, and that during the night loud screams had been heard from the woman. An examination was made of the body, and it was found covered with wounds. An inquest was then held, and to-night the jury returned a verdict which states that she died from injuries inflicted by her husband, and Curry was committed to jail.

By telegraph to the Dispatch. LULING, TEXAS, August 15.—Yesterday afternoon Lawrence Denman met Rev. G. Sewell on the street, and drawing a navy revolver fired at the minister four times, inflicting wounds which in a short time caused his death. The cause leading to the shooting are of a domestic nature, and can only be published on the trial of the case. No one blames Denman, and yet Rev. Mr. Sewell is regarded as the victim of a conspiracy, as he asserted in his anonymous statement. Both parties are highly connected. Mr. Sewell is a Methodist clergyman, and local agent of the American Bible Society.

Hanlon Wins Again. WATKINS, N. Y., August 15.—The first trial of the professional foot-race here to-day had six starters—Wallace, Ross, Plasted, Griffin, Lee, and Courtney. It was won by Ross in 10:42 by a half-length; Lee second, Courtney third. Lee crowded into Courtney's course in the first half-mile, so that, to avoid a foul, the latter virtually ceased to exert himself, and Courtney did not claim the race, and was consequently out of the race, Lee being given the second place. As a result of the trial heats the race was between Hanlon, Hosmer, Wallace, Ross, and Lee, and in this order they reached the finish. Hanlon won in 21 minutes 9 seconds. Distance, three miles, with a turn. The water was choppy a d wind high, so that the start announced for 2:30 P. M. was not made until 5:38 o'clock. Notwithstanding the general distrust of Courtney he was next to Hanlon in the betting, and a large amount of money was bet on him. Courtney in the first trial heat was freely charged that there was an understanding between him and Lee.

The amateur races were very fine, and afforded much more genuine satisfaction than the professional races.

Anti-Jewish Riots. LONDON, August 15.—A mob broke out at New Pesth, Hungary, yesterday, against a Jewish baker, whose house was wrecked. The mob was dispersed by the police, who arrested fifty persons and wounded a large number. There were also anti-Semitic riots at Oldenburg, Germany, where the mob was charged by cavalry and eighty-nine persons were arrested.

The Situation of Affairs in Russia. LONDON, August 15.—A dispatch to the Times from St. Petersburg, referring to the situation of affairs in that country, says that arrests of students occur daily. Much dissatisfaction has been discovered at the school of the south, as regards the attitude of the students in the civil schools the Minister of Education has addressed a circular to all of his subordinates. More or less important traces of a seditious propaganda have been discovered in thirteen gymnasia, and in twenty secondary schools. There have been serious disorders in fourteen gymnasia. The scholastic authorities have been urged to enforce discipline in the educational institutions, and to call in the aid of the police if necessary.

The Spanish Disorders. MADRID, August 15.—The train running between Barcelona and Granada, which was derailed and plundered yesterday evening by thirty armed men. It is reported that the robbers obtained booty to the value of 50,000 pesetas (\$10,000). The Spanish consul at Perpignan, France, reports that numerous persons supposed to be criminals, and of various origins, and of various ages, and twelve captains have been interned by France.

Italy's Ultimatum to Morocco. LONDON, August 15.—The Exchange Telegraph Company has a dispatch from Gibraltar saying the Italian Envoy at Tangier, Morocco, has lowered the flag on the consulate, and the inhabitants are in consequence in a state of great alarm. The ultimatum of the Italian Government is in effect, and the Sultan of Morocco not having yielded to the ultimatum of Italy insisting upon the full payment of claims of Italian subjects. There is an Italian squadron in the harbor in readiness to support the demands of the ultimatum.

Prussia Constrains to the Vatican. ROME, August 15.—The remonstrance made by Prussia to the Vatican concerning the latter's subsidized organ, *Moniteur de Rome*, was prompted by an article in that paper calling the inhabitants of Brandenburg a disaffected and rebellious people, and throwing responsibility for the latter's disaffection on the German Government. The article stated that it would withdraw the subsidy to the paper if such language was repeated.

Another Earthquake Expected at Ischia. LONDON, August 15.—There are alarming signs of an earthquake in Ischia, on the island of Ischia. The ground is cracking and the sea is surging from fissures in the ground. The Minister of Public Works has issued an order for the immediate erection of huts for the accommodation of the people in case they are compelled to vacate their houses.

Twelve Men Precipitated to Death. LONDON, August 15.—While thirteen men were being hauled to the surface at a mine near the town of Redruth, Cornwall, to-day, the rope attached to the car in which they were standing broke, and twelve of them were precipitated to the bottom of the shaft and instantly killed.

The Case of Canon Bernard. BUNDESBURG, August 15.—The public prosecution has appeared against the Rev. Canon Bernard, who is charged with breach of trust and purloining money and stocks from the Episcopal palace of Tournai.

Angry Depositors Hold a Bank. LONDON, August 15.—A party of depositors in a small savings bank in London, angry at their inability to draw their money on demand, ordered the bank and the directors to be closed. The police were called on, but refused to interfere.
