HORRIBLE STORY OF THE SEA. A Captain Found Insane and Every One on Board Badly Frozen.

A Boston special of the 7th says: "I found the Baltimore schooner Stephen J. Fooks drifting helplessly off George's Bank, with her crew in a terrible condition," said Captain James, of the Portsmouth fisherman Mary S. Hontack, which reached this port to-day. "She was abandoned with the crew very topmast, and every sea was breaking over her. Her sails were all blown away, and she had seven feet of water to the hold. When we boarded her we found Captain Crammer lashed to the mast shouting and screaming at the top of his voice. He had become insane through suffering, and after breaking up the cabin furniture, with a loaded revolver in each hand had started to kill all aboard. The crew overpowered him after a terrible struggle and secured him as he was found. His hands and feet were terribly frost-bitten. When we boarded the vessel none of the crew were able to move, they were so badly frozen. They had no food for two days, and their water was all salt. They were drifting for a week, in which time they had come 200 miles. The Fooks struck a shoal off Martha's Vineyard February 28 and sprang a leak. The men worked at the pumps until they dropped from exhaustion and were almost dead with the cold." The captain, steward, and mate, who suffered the most, have been taken to the Marine Hospital in Chelsea. The others of the crew were cared for in Boston. The Stephen J. Fooks was bound from Elizabethport for Boston with 685 tons of coal. She was a three-masted, built in 1874 at Solomon's Island, Md., 408 tons burden. Captain T. J. Crammer is also her principal owner. She is now being towed to Gloucester by the fisherman Fanny Belle, which at last accounts had forty miles off Cape Ann.

ALL THROUGH THE STATE. PETERSBURG AND VICINITY.

The Case of Alleged Embezzlement-The Prisoner Sent to Tennessee-A Peculiar Case of Arson.

(Correspondence of the Richmond Dispatch.) MARCH 8, 1884. W. M. Mason, who was arrested in this city last evening on the charge of embezzlement of the funds of the Wheeler & Wilson Sewing-Machine Company, committed in Maury county, Tenn., was this morning sent to that State for trial. He was handcuffed and taken from the jail to the train. He was taken up on a warrant of arrest and rendition issued yesterday by Governor Cameron, and brought over to this city by one of the company's agents in Tennessee, and his arrest, coupled with the character of the charges, caused much surprise.

Mason came to this city soon after the war with a Federal regiment. While stationed here he was married to a girl of this city, who accompanied him to the North-west when his regiment was ordered away. Her husband was discharged from the army he came back to Petersburg for awhile, and was divorced from his wife. He subsequently married a lady in Richmond, the widow of a Petersburg, who was accidentally killed in Baltimore. He lived in Baltimore, and for some time, then went to Baltimore, and claimed that he was charged with being engaged in the service of the Wheeler & Wilson Company. It is claimed that while thus employed the alleged embezzlement was committed, amounting to upwards of \$500 in small sums.

He sold through the country at prices much below their value, turned the money to his own use, and made fraudulent returns to the company. It is further reported that he has a wife living in Tennessee, and that the charge of bigamy may be brought against him. Mason returned to this city a little over two months ago, and secured employment in the Wheeler & Wilson office here. He is about forty years of age, an active business-man, and pleasant in manners. He claims that prosecution against him is malicious, that he will be acquitted, and exhibits a long scar on his head, the result, he says, of a wound inflicted by an agent of the company with whom he had a difficulty, and who would claim on the roadside.

Some of somewhat singular character was brought before the Mayor this morning. Last night a colored woman named Sarah Smith returned from her work to her home in Pocahontas, and kindled her fire to cook supper. She then took a piece of wood to a neighbor's after her baby, where she was accustomed to leave the child during the day. When she returned she found that her house had been broken open, a good deal of her property destroyed, her bed torn to pieces and thrown into the fire, and appearances indicated that an effort had been made to burn the building. On the floor was found a sealed note, bearing the signature of a near neighbor, written in obscene terms. She at once took out warrants for the arrest of her neighbor, and placed her daughter on two charges each of house-breaking and attempted arson. There was no evidence to implicate the accused, and they were discharged. It is believed some malicious person committed the act and left the note on the floor to the suspicion of the women who were arrested.

Virginia News Notes. In Pittsylvania county, on Wednesday, a colored man named Nathan Kirby, employed at a saw-mill near Chatham, Va., was killed by an accident. While engaged about the engine his hand came in contact with the saw, and was severed near the palm. The blood flowed freely, and could not be checked until the injured man had been carried to Chatham, where the services of three physicians were employed.

The Wytheville Enterprise says: A wolf got into the sheep-fold of Mr. Joseph Hedrick, who lives in Stony Fork, a few days since, killing two of the flock and crippling a third.

The Lynchburg Virginian says: We are informed that Mr. Edward Floyd, a resident of Madison, dropped dead yesterday afternoon. His death, it is thought, was caused by a rupture of the heart. He leaves a wife and several children.

Southern Methodist Conference. (Baltimore American.) The Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South will begin its annual session at 2 o'clock next Wednesday morning in Calvary church, corner of Lombard and Greene streets. Bishop Alpheus Wilson will preside, and it is expected that Bishop Hargrove will also be present. There are 187 ministers in the conference, and about 1,000 laymen will be present. The lay delegation in the Baltimore Conference is much larger than in other similar bodies. Under the three-year rule, which is generally observed in the city churches, no changes are looked for, and no action is necessary in the appointments generally.

As this is the centennial year of Methodism, special services in honor of that occurrence will be held. Dr. John S. Martin, now of Winchester, who has been secretary of the Conference for over thirty years, will preach the centennial sermon. The anniversary of the Church Extension Society, of which Dr. Morton, of Louisville, Ky., is secretary, will also be celebrated. It is probable that some action will also be taken towards having the Conference represented in the great Congress of Methodists from all parts of the United States, which will be held next December. Dr. McFerrin, agent of the Methodist Book Concern at Nashville, who has been recently ill, is expected as a visitor. A full attendance may be looked for.
