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COMMON COUNCIL.

LIGHT FOR LEE CAMP.

New Gas-Mains to be Laid--New Voting-Places Discussed--The Culvert-Tax Question Agitated, &c.

The regular monthly meeting of the Common Council was held yesterday evening at 5:25 o'clock--the President, Mr. J. T. Ellyson, in the chair. The following members were present: Messrs. Adams, Allen, Archer, Balen, Bowie, Brauer, Campbell, Clarke, Catlett, Elliott, Frischkorn, Gunn, Hargrove, Hayes, Higgins, Hooper, Hughes, King, McDowell, Metzger, Miller, Patton, Phillips, Randolph, Ross, Straus, Turpin, and Weisker.

FREE GAS FOR LEE CAMP.
The Sergeant-at-Arms presented a communication from Mayor Carrington asking that free gas be given Lee Camp during the continuation of their fair. Laid on the table, on motion of Mr. Higgins, who stated that the Committee on Light had an application for said purpose before them; that it had been agreed and that at the proper time the report would be presented.

FINANCE COMMITTEE.
Mr. HARGROVE, from the Committee on Finance, presented a report recommending that the Auditor mark "satisfied" the taxes standing in the name of E. A. Stratton, amounting to \$118.30 for the year 1870, as shown on the list in the Auditor's office. Also, adversely reporting upon the appropriation of \$5,200 to C. Y. Morris and others for the extension of Harrison street.

Mr. King, from the Committee on the Fire Department, presented a report recommending that certain parties be allowed to build frame houses, and also rejecting similar proposals. Adopted.

Mr. Bowen, from the Committee on Elections, presented an ordinance creating additional voting-precincts in Monroe, Clay, and Jackson wards, which was briefly discussed and tabled.

Mr. Metzger, from a special committee to inquire into the necessity of having a work-house, presented a report recommending the establishment of the same, and a resolution that the subject be referred to the Committee on Grounds and Buildings. Adopted.

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BASE-BALL YESTERDAY.

Richmond and Westmoreland Club Nines Play a Game--The Westmoreland Wins.

Yesterday two nines selected from the Westmoreland and Richmond clubs played a game of base-ball at the Virginia park. The game was an amateur one, the players mostly young men, leading members of the two clubs mentioned. They had come out for the purpose of aiding the effort to build a home for crippled and indigent Confederate soldiers.

THE GAME COMMENCED.
The first man, with a round painted stick of wood called a bat, made some monstrous big licks, but missed the ball, and stood aside. The next man hit a ball, dropped his club, and scooted around the field. A man with a brooch on his forehead and a cap on his head, "Who's the sphere?" "Who's that fellow with the blue breeches on?" and "He will make a thousand errors," and shouts of laughter followed.

THE WESTMORELANDS NEXT.
The ladies of the Hollywood Memorial Association have fixed upon Wednesday, 21st instant, for the annual decoration of graves of soldiers buried in that cemetery. Invitations have been extended to the Stuart Troop, the Howitzers, Blues, and First Regiment, and to Lee Camp and Phil. Kearney in this city, and similar sections of both armies, to take part in the ceremonies.
