The incumbent Mr. Yerxa defeated W. A. Kindred for the majority of Fargo, Monday, nearly two to one. Mr. Kindred's friends and especially THE ARGUS made a most woeful blunder when they and it undertook to make the fight purely on the question of immorality, by publishing Yerxa's filthy record. Respectable people do not care to be burdened with such a warfare and disgrace and it never fails to down the man or party indulging in it. It may be that Yerxa will now do much to retrieve his lost character—he should—but his time will evidently come, and would have come sooner had his opposition understood human nature. We take it that the people of Fargo do not love immorality any better than do people of other places, and that they showed a humane instinct by stepping in and preventing a cold blooded murder, waged through selfish motives, as are all such raids. The very fact of so much apparent truth in this case added to its degrading effect, and the recoil was extraordinary. However, it was principle involved, and Mayor Yerxa must brace up if he hopes to gain and retain the respect of his people.

Shade Trees. Mr. A. H. Taisey of Donnelly, Minnesota, is in town this week with a view to furnish our people with shade trees from his nursery. He has box elder, cuttewood, ash and soft maple, all the way from one and a half inches through, to four inches through, and from ten to twenty feet high, six years old. Mr. T. called at THE TIMES office yesterday morning and said in this connection that as soon as the frost was sufficiently out of the ground he would bring a car load of trees to Wahpeton, which he would sell at 50 cents each, and superintend the setting of them out and then guarantee the growth of every one on them, replacing all that does not grow. And in the matter of Arbor Day Mr. T. said that should the frost be sufficiently out of the ground at that time, there was nothing to prevent him from being here, and would be pleased to assist our people in properly observing the day. His plan is for the purchaser to have the holes dug, say three or four feet across and two or three feet deep, and then he himself to superintend the setting of each tree. We think this a very reasonable price for the trees, and people could not, certainly, expend their money in a more worthy cause. A general movement in this direction would add immensely to Wahpeton's attractiveness and worth.

Which is the Sabbath? Something for protestants to think of. A Catholic priest in the opera house in Hartford, Kansas, Feb. 18, 1884, as reported in the Hartford Weekly of February 22, 1884, spoke as follows:

Christ gave the church power to make laws binding upon the conscience. Show me one set that claims or possesses the power to do so, save the Catholic church. There is none, and yet all Christendom acknowledges the power of the church to do so, as I will prove to you. For example, the observance of Sunday. How can protestant denominations keep this day? The bible commands you to keep the SABBATH DAY. Sunday is not the Sabbath day. No man dares assert that it is; for the bible says as plainly as words can make it that the SEVENTH DAY is the Sabbath, i. e. Saturday, for we all know that Sunday is the first day of the week. I am not rich, but I will give \$1,000 to any man who will prove by the bible alone that Sunday is the day to keep for the Sabbath. No it cannot be done. It is impossible. The observance of Sunday is solely a law of the Catholic church and therefore is not binding on others. Our church changed the Sabbath to Sunday, and the Protestant world bowed down and worshiped upon that day in silent obedience to the mandates of the Catholic church. Is this not a living miracle—that those who like us so bitterly obey and acknowledge our power every week, and do not know it? Comment is unnecessary. Which day do you keep, and why? J. N. McMILLAN.
