positor in the Hillsboro Banner
office, has recently died of consump-
tion in Wisconsin.

A Black Hills justice has decided
that the fence law is in force in the
Hills county, notwithstanding the
effort of the legislature to repeal it.

The Lead City Tribune has ap-
peared in a new form. The patent
insides are discarded and it is a
decided improvement on the old style.

Two years ago there were but five
white inhabitants in Ramsey county;
now there are 1,820 who pay taxes
on about \$750,000 worth of property.

were drowned in an old well last
Friday.

Press and Dakotian: Yankton
county's assessed valuation for the
year 1884, as returned by the as-
sessor, amounts to \$2,087,539, a gain
of something over a quarter of a
million dollars in a year.

Deadwood Times: The assessor's
tax list shows an assessed valuation
of real and personal property in the
county of \$5,901,226, against \$3,250,
000 last year, an increase of about
\$700,000. The assessed valuation
of Deadwood is \$1,128,000.

Hillsboro Banner: Trail county,
with \$70,000 of assets, of which
\$40,000 is cash, takes no back seat
in the list of counties whose financial
matters have been successfully man-
aged. No county tax, or at least
but a nominal one, will be levied
this year.

Charles Mix, after whom the

and who was at the time of its or-
ganization and for 20 years chief
clerk of the general land office at
Washington, shot and killed him-
self at Richmond springs, New York
on the 28th of June.

Grand Forks Herald, 10th: The

said to be a complete loss. Reports
from the neighborhood of Ojata in-
dicate considerable damage in that
locality.

Grant and Ward.
Under date of the 7th instant a
telegraphic report from New York
furnishes the following interesting
facts and figures tending to show
how Grant and Ward done business.
Their liabilities are shown to be
\$16,792,647, while their assets are
but \$67,174. The telegram contin-
ues: "Assignee Davis has filed his
inventory in the Grant & Ward
case, showing liabilities of \$16,792,
647, nominal assets, \$27,138,038;
real assets, \$67,174. The assignee
says it is impossible to ascertain
who are the owners of all securities
in possession of Grant & Ward at
the time of the failure. The books
do not show with any accuracy the
transactions of the firm. No cash
book or journal was ever kept. No
balance sheet has ever been taken,
and no complete list of assets ap-
pears either upon their books or
among their papers. The assignee
says he had to depend on statements
of members of the firm and those
claiming to hold obligations of the
firm or doing business with it. In
nearly every case where the firm
had dealings with customers or
pledges of securities, the stocks or
bonds left in their custody had
either been sold or rehypothecated.
No complete book of bills payable
and receivable was kept. In cases
where stock were rehypothecated,
they were generally rehypothecated
for larger amounts than had been
loaned by Grant & Ward upon them.
Nearly all of the firm's or any sub-
stantial value which came into the
possession of the assignee, May 8,
1864, are claimed by third parties.
Very large pecuniary transactions
in the name of Grant & Ward were
carried on by Fish & Ward during
1862, 1863 and 1864, of which no
record appears on the books of the
firm, and the only evidence of
which is found in individual check
books of Ward and in memoranda
in private books of the assignee. In
information came to him that Grant
& Ward represented to various par-
ties that the firm had contracts with
the United States government which
were exceedingly profitable; that
they borrowed immense sums from
various parties for the alleged pur-
pose of investment by the firm in
such alleged contracts, and the lend-
ers were guaranteed profits of cer-

at usurious rates, and upon fraudu-
lent representations. He believes
the law to be that, so far as the de-
fense of usury is concerned, Grant
& Ward have waived that defense
by entering the particulars in sched-
ule "A," and he does not admit that
any of these parties are entitled to
receive anything from the estate.

The August Century.
As usual with the "Midsummer Holiday Num-
ber," the August Century is uncommonly at-
tractive in pictures, fiction, and anecdotal
papers. An outdoor quality, appropriate to the
season, is noticeable in John Burroughs's fresh
woodland and sabbid paper. "A Glance at British
Wild Flowers," which Alfred Parsons, the Eng-
lish artist, has illustrated in a lively descrip-
tive style. One of his full-page sketches of daffodils
on the border of a stream is the frontispiece.
Of midsummer character, as well, are two brief
essays, one "A Summer Holiday" meditation
by Miss Edith M. Thomas; and the other, an
essay by Dr. Edward Eggleston on "American
Play," in spite of a popular prejudice that we
are an over-worked, heavy-hearted people.

Of the anecdotal papers, W. T. Stearns's sketch
of "Chinese Gordon" has the flavor of personal
acquaintance set forth with interesting and
graphic characterization. Miss Helen Zimera
gives an intimate biographical sketch of the
queen of Romania, who is known in literature
as "Carmen Sylva." It is accompanied by a
full-page portrait of the queen in a Romanian cos-
tume, and a sketch of the queen's life. The
sketch of the queen's life is a very interesting
story of the Greenwich quarter in New York, en-
titled "An Effect in Yellow," by "Ivory Black,"
the author of "The Middle" which appeared in
the May number; and a continuation of Mr.
Cable's "Dr. Sevier," which contains stirring
scenes of the war, probably as vivid and effective as anything Mr. Cable has
yet written.

The serious side of the number includes an
important paper by Isaac L. Rice, who lays out
"Work for a Constitutional Convention"; he
would have cabinet members sit in congress and
be responsible to the country for the inception
of legislative work, and the execution of the
policy of the land; a striking paper by the Rev. Dr.
Washington Gladden, on "Three Dangers" to
