On motion board adjourned to Friday, July 25th, 1884, 9 o'clock a. m.
Friday July 25th, 1884, 9 o'clock a. m.
Board called to order. Members all present.
A petition from Justice Frank E. Walcott, was received praying for legal assistance to preserve the peace in the village of Walcott, which was examined and W. E. Purcell engaged by the board of county commissioners to go to the village of Walcott and render the assistance asked for in behalf of the territory, and he is hereby instructed to investigate the cause of the complaints which are creating so much expense to the county.

On motion board adjourned to 2 o'clock p. m. Two o'clock p. m. Board called to order. Members all present.
The petition presented by Mr. J. R. Harris, chairman of the board of county commissioners of Richland county, asking that the county of Richland appropriate one hundred and seventy-five dollars yearly to repair the pontoon bridge at Fort Abercrombie, constructed by the State of Minnesota and said Wilkin county, was rejected.

On motion the application and bond of Adolf Hofner for a liquor license for Moorston was accepted and the auditor instructed to issue the license.

On motion the application and bond of Mathias Kraker for a liquor license for town of Wahpeton was accepted and the auditor instructed to issue the license.

On motion the quarterly report of C. A. Wells, Justice of the Peace, was rejected, the same being unintelligible.

The petition of Samuel Stevens asking that the taxes paid by him on the SW 1/4 sec 23 town 125 range 51 be refunded, was rejected.

On motion board adjourned to July 26th, 1884, at 9 o'clock a. m.
Saturday July 26th A. D. 1884, 9 o'clock a. m. Board called to order by the chairman. Members all present.

On motion Dr. A. H. Marse, of Walcott was appointed as county physician for the first district

of Richland county at a salary of two hundred and fifty dollars per year commencing from this date, and his bonds fixed at five hundred dollars for the faithful performance of his duty.
On motion board adjourned to 9 o'clock p. m. On motion William E. Purcell was appointed as county attorney until his successor is elected a qualified.
The following resolution was accepted and adopted.
Resolved, That Mr. Behr, of the township of DeVillo, who has become a county charge, and who is in a helpless condition be sent to the P. O. hospital for treatment, and commissioner Doerr is hereby appointed a committee to see that he has a proper transportation, and to see that the best possible terms be secured for his maintenance not to exceed ten dollars per week.

To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners Richland County.
Gentlemen: Having been appointed a committee of one to have the court-house well refixed I hereby beg leave to submit the following report.
First. By measuring the total depth of said well I find it to be 106 feet 4 inches.
Second. Comparing these figures with the figures on a certain bill against the county, dated June 5, 1882, sworn to by Joseph Lehman, and certified to as to its correctness by Chas. Damerel, county commissioner I find an over charge of 18 feet and 7 inches at \$2.50 per foot, said bill being in total for 119 feet and 11 inches.
Third. Action having been taken by the county board in regard to the work done at said well under my supervision, I now call your attention to part second of this report and advise immediate action thereon.
