News Notes.

In the Superior court at Charlotte, N. C. two negroes convicted of bur-
glary were sentenced to be hanged.

Miss Bridget Collins, aged eighty-
two, died while on her knees at mass
in St. Francis Xavier's church New
York, Sunday.

At the new Mexican village of
Chimayo, Juinata Herrera, a Mexi-
can woman supposed to be a witch,
was murdered by three desperadoes
in the most atrocious manner.

Louis Christenson, aged eighteen,
awaiting trial for murder; August
Mullen, aged forty, charged with
burglary, and John Stewart, charged
with forgery, escaped from Racine,
Wis., jail last Thursday night.

The wealthiest man in the world in
the Chinese banker, Han-Qua of
Canton. He pays taxes upon an es-
tate of \$450,000,000, and is estimat-
ed to be worth 1,000,000,000 taels,
which in our money would be about
\$1,000,400,000.

Burnside, Ill. 12: At the wedding
of S. D. Stoner and Mrs. M. J. Scott
last night, canned fruit poisoned
several persons, including the bride
and minister. Three victims, John
Wilson, Jennie Estlingtrausen, and
Mrs. Broeden, will die.

A sensational letter passed over
the congregation at the First Meth-
odist church in Auburn, N. Y., Sun-
day evening, when Rev. Dr. Quail,
the pastor, said: "Those who do not
want to hear me say anything about
skating rinks had better stay at
home next Sunday evening."

Detroit, Mich., 13: The schooner
J. T. Motz, from Oswego, N. Y., was
struck by an unknown craft from
Lake Erie four miles southeast of
Colchester, and sank in 12 feet of
water. The crew reached Colches-
ter this morning in a yawl. No as-
sistance was given them by the col-
liding craft.

Detroit, Mich., 12: Yesterday the
roof of the new building of the De-
troit roller skating rink company on
Second avenue fell, burying eight
workmen in the ruins. The men
were extricated, most of them being
injured. Two of them, Antonio
Antoin and Fred Moses, have since
died.

A man and woman, both unknown,
were found dead near Sanbrunc,
Cal., each with a bullet hole in the
head. In the man's pocket was a
card with the name J. I. Reynolds
written on it. Over the name was pen-
ciled, "My mother's address is Mrs. B. R.
Goot, 175, State Street, Brooklyn,
N. Y."

Yankton, 13: At a late hour last
night the jury in the case of Ed-
ward McKenna, on trial for the mur-
der of Nicholas Berringer, Decem-
ber at Tyndall, returned a ver-
dict of not guilty. Berringer was
killed in a drunken row in which
McKenna was involved, the prosecu-
tion claiming that McKenna
stabbed Berringer with a knife. A
change of venue was taken to Yank-
ton county by the defense. The
trial occupied two weeks, and was a
complicated one. The verdict cre-
ates little surprise.

Duluth, 13: Last Saturday the
treasurer of Herman township,
named Stressaw, ended his term of
office. Friday he came to this
city and drew \$600 belonging to the
township out of the bank and start-
ed home with it in his pocket. He
returned shortly and claimed he lost
the money through a rent in his
pocket, which looked as though it
had been recently cut with a knife.
He said a knife, loose change and
other articles in his pocket had been
picked up by a German named Lick,
whom he believed had the money.
The officers put no faith in the
story, and today a detective was
sent out to Stressaw's home to ar-
rest him.

New Haven, Conn., 13: William
Johnson (colored), a fugitive from
justice, came back to Wallingford
last night and murdered his wife.
Johnson's wife and her two children
had been living at William Smith's
near Centertown, for some time.
About midnight Johnson broke into
the house and taking an axe went
upstairs to where his wife and two
children were sleeping. Another
colored man named Jackson was
sleeping in a front room. Johnson
first struck him and then turned for

Special meeting of town trustees was held
this day. Members present, Hayward, Bauer,
Miksha and Giddings.

Motion by Mr. Miksha, and seconded by Mr.

on real and personal property (1884 valuation)
for road tax, and a personal assessment of two
days poll tax be made on each male person over
21 years of age and under 60, whose name ap-
pears in the list returned by the road overseer,
according to section laws of 1884-carried.

Commissioners' Proceedings.
Territory of Dakota, County of Richland, ss.
Auditor's office, Sept. 1st, 1884.

Adjourned meeting of the Board of County
Commissioners was called to order by the chair-
man. Members all present.

The following resolution was accepted and
adopted:

Resolved, That the taxes levied for the year
1884 be, and the same is hereby fixed as follows
to-wit:

For county general fund, 6 mills,
For county school fund, 2 mills,
For county road and bridge fund, 1.5-10 mills,
For county sinking fund, 2 mills,
For county poor farm fund, 2-10 mills,
Total levy for county purposes, 11 7-10 mills.

To this is added territorial tax levied as ordered
by territorial auditor of 3-10 mills, making to-
tal county and territorial tax levy for year 1884
amount to 15 mills.

On motion board adjourned to 2 o'clock p. m.
Two o'clock p. m. Board called to order by
chairman. Members all present.

The board proceeded to examine the bridge
business still unsettled and proceeded to exam-
ine the election laws, in which it was found that
the notice of election had to be sent, and posted
by the sheriff, and the auditor was instructed to
have the proper notices posted, in conformity
with law.

On motion board adjourned to 9 o'clock
Tuesday morning, Sept. 2nd, 1884.

Tuesday Sept. 2nd, 1884, 9 o'clock, a. m.
Board called to order. Members all present.

Judge Dow appeared before the board, and
in behalf of Mrs. Victoria's dead and dumb
boy, petitioning that the boy be sent to the
asylum at Sioux Falls, in the boy being an un-
person to remain in the custody of his mother,
and the mother being unable to defray the
expense of sending said boy to the asylum and
maintain him when there.

On motion Mr. J. P. Doerr was appointed
committee with the action to be taken by the
boy to the Sioux Falls asylum, could do so
without incurring the expense of the
guardians, and report at the next meeting
of the board.

On motion Mr. Theo. D. Riddle was appointed
committee to see to the removal of the
house chimneys constructed by Riddle
not to exceed thirty-five dollars.

On motion Mr. Frank B. Schott was appointed
a committee to superintend the construction of
the Berlin and Belford bridges.

On motion Mr. J. P. Doerr was appointed
a committee to superintend the construction of
the Moore and Abernethy bridges.

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Members all present.

On motion the application and bond for a
liquor license applied for by Hans K. Quamme
was accepted and allowed and the auditor in-
structed to issue a license running to January
8th, 1885.

On motion the application and bond together
with treasurer's receipt for one hundred dollars
paid under protest by Martin Schett, was
accepted, and the auditor instructed to issue a li-
cense to said Martin Schott, to expire on the first
Monday in January, 1885.
