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LATEST BUT STILL UNCERTAIN

By official returns reported from every county, Cleveland and Hendricks have carried the state of New York by a safe and wide majority.

The Republican state committee, at midnight, still claims this state for 5,000 to 6,000 for Blaine. Their estimates are based upon the Democratic claims of gains, which they believe are not up to the increase of the vote over 1880.

The Tribune at this hour claims that Blaine has carried the state and is therefore elected president. Its belief is founded upon the following figures: Returns from 1,742 election districts outside of New York and Kings counties give Blaine 389,404, Cleveland 382,119.

The Tribune now claims the state by 1,600 plurality. "There is nothing," says the Tribune "in the returns from the remainder of the state to indicate a probability of the Democrats overcoming that."
