SUFFRAGE ECHOES

Men of our nation: An army is advancing upon you. It is not firing upon you from concealed trenches. It does not strike traitorously from cruel submarines. It flies no Zeppelins. On an open field, in broad daylight this army is marching straight forward, asking of you unconditional surrender of the monopoly of the privileges and responsibilities of democracy.

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
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

START BUILDING NEW LINE SOON

It is Now Thought That Proposed New Railway is a Certainty

A PROFITABLE VENTURE

Promoters Claim New Road Will Open Up a Fine Territory and Pay From the Start

It is expected that work will commence on the proposed line of railroad through from Waubay to Hankinson, N. D., connecting with the Fairmount & Veblen line at both Grenville and Effington, with the northern terminal at Hankinson.

C. H. Henderson, the promoter of the proposed line, stated that practically all of the preliminary preparations were in shape to commence work as soon as he ascertained if there would be sufficient business to warrant the line being constructed this year. The bond issue has been floated, he claims, and the money for construction purposes is available at any time.

The company is not asking for any bonus, nor is there any stock for sale. All that is being asked is terminal sites and the support of the people enroute. The surveys have already been completed.

The advantages of such a line running north and south through this section of the state would be many and varied. At present there is no connecting line between the western terminus of the Fairmount & Veblen line at Grenville, people wishing to reach Grenville by rail having to go into Minnesota and then double back west. The territory this line proposes to open up is one of the richest in the state, and highly productive.
