That is View of Leaders of Conference Coming on Feb. 3 at Chicago.

Gray affirms that while German militarism is dead, the German theology that made it possible still lives; that never was there a sterner demand on Christians of the evangelized faith, never a sterner call for a bold and united testimony.

COUNTY PAYING OUT BIG SUMS

Inroads made on the county treasury during December by payments of large sums to the city of Great Falls and to the district school reduced the balance of the treasury to a very low level, being that of the previous month, there being on hand on the last day of 1918 in all funds \$1,500,619.36 as compared with \$1,890,655.20 on the corresponding date in November. The November balance was the largest ever reported by a casual count of treasurers, but would have been exceeded by Treasurer Claude Glenn's December statement had it not been for necessary payments from the trust and agency funds.

During December Great Falls city received from the county \$2,965.49; Dennis \$227,021.20 and \$101,274.97 was paid to the school district, the two payments making a total of \$328,296.26 from the treasury. Money paid out from the different county funds amounted to \$51,980.91, which with \$81.25 from the fund transferred by district court clerk, makes a total of \$52,062.16. The road fund and other items brot the grand total of expenditures up to \$382,028.42. Receipts for the month totaled \$21,992.88. Tax payments amounted to \$5,971.35 and \$2,643.14 was received from licenses. County officers' fees here totaled \$2,965.49 and other sources yielded \$11,992.38.

On December 31 there was in the county general fund \$90,152.66; road fund, \$53,420.54; poor fund, \$3,081.49; bridge fund, \$48,945.14; contingent fund, \$40,892.61; bond interest, \$39,462.66; county sinking, \$3,707.45; fire fund, \$2,897.18; tax \$24,720.14; state fund, \$14,442; migratory stock, \$375.31; high school, \$113,846.34; state road maintenance, \$1,919.07; gopher fund, \$3,827.46. Total in county funds, \$944,064.34.

In the trust and agency funds there was on hand the following amounts: General school, \$157,129.46; district school, \$181,485.76; state, \$94,468.78; state bounty, \$4,155.18; Great Falls city, \$570.41; Belt city, \$5,392.47; Neilhart city, \$1,140.91; Cascade city, \$2,980.79; district court clerk deposits, \$1,520.28; redemption fund, \$396.74; estates, \$45,758.18; trust and agency portion protest tax, \$68,126.96; migratory stock, \$508.37; asylum and interest, \$8,790.40; asylum and sanitary improvements, \$1,759.89; expenses board of stock commissioners, \$1,315.97; livestock sanitary fund, \$2,430.13; covered no real estate, \$101.58; Cascade special, \$3,690.45; hail insurance, \$11,298.10; Great Falls road, \$14; war defense fund, \$4,399.71. Total trust and agency, \$558,615.02.

Payments to the state during the first days of January by Treasurer Glenn will be in effect of reducing the total to be enumerated in the January statement somewhat below the December figure.
