Among the many things which Mrs. Lily declares will have her attention are all measures which affect the welfare of women and children. She expects to introduce a bill prohibiting capital punishment for minors, another which will give to the judge of the children's court the power to appoint a guardian for children who are shown to have improper guardianship, and she will support any bills which deal with minimum wage and equal pay for equal work.

MRS. SAUNDERS, BRIDE OF THREE MONTHS, DEAD

Mrs. Robert A. Saunders, formerly Miss Ethel Parker of this city and a bride of but three months, died at Monson, Mont. yesterday, of influenza after an illness of but a week.

Mrs. Saunders was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Parker, 1612 Fourth avenue north, and is survived by her husband, her parents, and three sisters, Anna, Edythe and Frances, all of whom went to Conrad on their way to Monson last night upon receipt of word of their sister's death.

Mrs. Saunders was 22 years old. She was born in Chicago, but much of her life was passed in Great Falls. She attended school here and was graduated from the Central High school with the class of 1915.

She was married to Robert A. Saunders October 15, 1918, by Rev. V. B. Scott, of the Great Falls Presbyterian church. The funeral will be held at Conrad Friday afternoon at 2.

DRUG SHIPMENT BRINGS ARREST

H. Rivet, who gives his occupation as that of a miner and his age as 27, was arrested last evening for the federal authorities after he had allegedly twice called at the office of the United Railway Express company and asked for a package that was found to contain \$400 worth of prohibited drugs. The police were notified the first of the week that a suspicious package had arrived from Seattle and an officer was put on watch at the suggestion of Deputy Revenue Collector L. H. Mann for the purpose of apprehending the person who would eventually call for the shipment. Rivet appeared twice yesterday and asked for the package, but, evidently becoming suspicious himself, left the first time without offering an explanation of his departure.

Later in the day he called again, and repeated his former conduct, but this time saying he was going to the post office and would call for the package when he came back. He did not return and last night he was arrested at a residence on Seventh avenue north by the police. At the station he made no denial of his calls at the express office or that he went there to get the package, but offered the ancient explanation that he did so at the request of another man. This man's name, he said, was A. E. Jameson, the same as appearing in the address. Jameson, he declared, is a veterinarian and has a license to handle the drugs contained in the parcel. The police do not know of a veterinarian of that name, nor do they know whether Rivet is properly identifying himself.

The package is rather bulky and contained a number of packages of morphine, cocaine and other drugs. It was shipped from Seattle, but the sender's name was not obtained by the police. Stamped in several places on the wrapping is the legend, "Syrup of Figs," but Rivet offered no explanation of this. Chief Marcus Anderson said the contents have a value of probably \$400.

Little is known locally of Rivet. The police obtained information going to show that he frequently travels between Great Falls and Butte and the suspicion naturally attaches that he is making a business of distributing forbidden drugs. The package was taken in charge by Deputy Mann and will be held as evidence against the prisoner.
