

HERRMANN OUSTED AS BASEBALL HEAD

Commission Will Have New Chairman—American Salaries Unchanged.

New York, Jan. 17.—No radical or immediate change in the personnel of the national commission appears likely as a result of the joint meeting of the National and American baseball leagues here yesterday afternoon. The club owners of the two major leagues went on record as favoring the retention of the three-man commission, but provision was made for the election of a new chairman in the place of Garry Herrmann.

It was decided that the presidents of the two organizations could each select two members of their respective leagues to act as a joint committee to select some person, outside of baseball, to act as the third man on the commission, providing such selected nominee is satisfactory to the two leagues as a whole.

Herrmann and the latter will continue as chairman of the National Commission until a new head is elected.

Following the early evening recess of the majors it was announced the big club owners would near the requests of the minors regarding changes in the draft rule at 11 a. m. tomorrow. This meeting was suddenly changed, however, to tonight.

Closer Connection. Progress was reported in the direction of closer business and playing agreements between the big league combinations. The 140 game-schedule was adopted for the both the National and American leagues and the latter announced that its playing dates would be published January 21. A no-recall of waiver rule was adopted by the American league, similar to that adopted by the Nationals yesterday, and the rule was also made binding as far as inter-league waivers were concerned.

The National commission was instructed to prepare a new system for distribution of world series money to the players of the competing clubs and submit its findings at a later date for approval. The National league also adopted a 21-player limit similar to that in vogue in the American.

It was announced the regular February meetings had been dispensed with for this year and the question of an annual joint meeting of the two leagues was left to the presidents of the leagues.

There was no change in the salary limit situation as far as the American league was concerned.

George Sisler, the St. Louis American club star, signed a 1919 contract with the Browns, but Ty Cobb did not appear to talk business with Manager Jennings of Detroit.

The Detroit team spring training camp was named as Macon, Ga., and the Boston Nationals will prepare for the pennant race at Columbus, Ga.
