FOGH TO BREAK OFF ARMISTICE IF GERMANS IN ANY WAY DELAY

Marshal Has No Fear of Foe's Ability to Hit Back at Bolshevik Invasion.

USE OF GERMAN SHIPS TO BE REPAID IN FOOD

Signing Featured by Enemy Protests and Demand to Raise the Blockade.

Paris, Jan. 18.—(Havas).—Marshal Foch, according to the Matin, will immediately break off the armistice with Germany if its conditions are not fulfilled.

Germany still possesses an army, the Marshal declared, but the allies hold the Rhine, which constitutes a formidable strategic barrier.

All the more important German passenger steamers, including the huge Imperator, may be used to transport American troops homeward.

Remuneration to be paid to Germany will be applied on payments of foodstuffs furnished to Germany under another part of the armistice.

The shipping arrangement was elaborated at meetings apart from the regular armistice commission and were the first civilian deliberations between Germans and representatives of the allied governments.

Edward N. Hurley, head of the American shipping board, presided.

LESS THAN 30 DIVISIONS LIKELY TO REMAIN OVER

Washington, Jan. 18.—President Wilson hasn't threatened to withdraw American troops from Germany if the peace conference refuses to make the terms of peace that he desires them to be, but it has been decided to reduce the American army now in France or engaged in occupation of parts of Germany.

NUMBER FIXED WITH ARMISTICE.

What strength is to be maintained is under discussion now by American military officials and the allied military leaders. No report has been received indicating the number of divisions to be supplied by the United States, but General March was positive that it would be far less than 30 divisions given in unofficial reports as the probable American military contribution.
