**HEIN RANCH AT PENDROY SOLD**

Gilcrest of Denton and Kearney, Neb., Buys 10,000 Acres From Bickford.

F. H. Gilcrest, of Kearney, Neb., and Denton, yesterday concluded a deal whereby he became the owner of the Jacob Hein ranch about five miles southwest of Pendroy. The ranch, which consists of some 10,000 acres of land, was sold to Mr. Gilcrest by H. K. Bickford, the consideration being announced as approximately \$200,000. The deal was made thru the Millsbaugh agency.

The 10,000 acres consist of some 7,000 acres that can be cultivated and the remainder is grazing land. Of the land which can be cultivated, about 3,000 acres have been broken and the rest is virgin sod.

Mr. Gilcrest owns a large tract near Denton and is a wealthy farmer and banker near Kearney, Neb. He proposes to operate the land he has just purchased as a combination grain and grazing ranch.

**SHELTON ACCUSED OF LAND FRAUDS**

Local Man Arrested on Charge of Falsely Representing Things to Settlers.

When United States Deputy Marshal A. G. Sathre was in the city last week, he placed under arrest James Shelton of the Shelton Land company, who is accused by indictment of the United States grand jury for the district of Wyoming with fraudulent representation in connection with locating people on land in that country. The indictment was returned in the Wyoming court and a transcript was filed with the Montana United States district court and a warrant issued to the marshal from the Montana district.

One of the allegations of the indictment is that Shelton has been guilty of locating persons on land which in fact does not exist. Shelton gave bond in the sum of \$1,000 before the local United States commissioner and a hearing will be granted him on Jan. 31.

**ONE BANK WILL HANDLE BOOKS**

Victor B. Sheldon, Cascade county agent, announced yesterday that the Stanton Trust & Savings bank has taken over the entire supply of farmers' account books, and in co-operation with the farm bureau and agricultural college at Bozeman will mail them out within the next two weeks to about 3,000 farmers in the county.

The plan of keeping an account of all sales and expenditures on the farm was necessitated by the income tax laws. The farmers had no system of telling how much grain they raised, how much stock was bought or sold, or any satisfactory business record.

The need of a system of bookkeeping was recognized by the bankers, who found it necessary to hire a number of extra clerks to keep the accounts in such shape to be available for reference for the income tax collector.

Previously the accounts were checked up and no record of profits and losses was given to the farmers. By the new system the farmer will keep his own books and will check up at the end of the year with the help of the county agent. He, of course, can keep his own books for reference, but must report to the income tax collector his complete income.


