Chicago, Jan. 25.—Hogs, receipts 13,000; market steady with yesterday's average; many light and light mixed unsold; bulk of sales \$17.40/67; butchers' \$17.50/67; light \$17.50/67; \$17.40; packing \$16.99/17.30; throw outs \$15.75/67; pigs, good to choice \$11.75/67; \$11.50. MOSS SAVED HEROES' LIVES. (Horace E. Thomas, in Leslie's.) One of the notable therapeutic developments of the war has been the extensive use of sphagnum (bog or peat moss) for surgical dressings. The moss has an absorbing capacity of 20 times its own weight, and has many times the absorbent power of cotton. This wonderful quality has commended it above all other materials for hospital purposes. Its availability in this respect was discovered by British medical men. The late Harry Smith, the playwright, interested in the American Red Cross later organized a bureau to collect it and prepare it for hospital bandages. There are 125 varieties, but only four are suitable for bandages. The proper varieties are found in this country in largest quantities in Oregon and Washington, and from these states the supply has been chiefly obtained. Members of the faculty of the universities of Oregon and Washington were made directors for those states, and college students, delegations of the Junior Red Cross, soldiers stationed at coast forts and many others engaged in the work of gathering and drying the moss. It became a regular custom to spend holidays and vacations in this service. The combined activities of all concerned resulted during the present year in an output of more than two million pads, each of which was designed to ease the suffering of an American boy wounded at the front.

The moss when gathered was sacked and shipped to Red Cross headquarters in Portland and Seattle. It was then distributed to the various Red Cross chapters, where dressings were made. It was first sorted, all extraneous substances being removed and the huge quantities divided into small strands. Afterward the moss was dried in the sun and the last trace of moisture was removed by an electric drying machine. At one large tennis club the roof of the clubhouse was covered with the drying trays at all times of the day. The congregation of the largest church in Portland was called together twice a week for moss work. Whenever an opportunity to help was offered the response was ready and whole-hearted.

Chicago, Jan. 25.—Heavy liquidation broke out again today, in the corn market, and smashed prices hard, notwithstanding a temporary check due to the passage of the \$100,000,000 measure to relieve food distress in Europe. Sentiment against domestic high cost of living was the predominant bearish influence. The close was unsettled, 2 to 5/8c net, with May \$1.15 to \$1.17 1/2 and July \$1.13. Oats fell 1/4 to 1/8c and provisions 7c to 8c.
