

# CAUFIELD NOW REPORTED DEAD

### Another Message From War Department Tells A. E. Caufield His Son Was Killed.

That Sergeant Royal A. Caufield, son of Deputy County Clerk and Mrs. A. E. Caufield, was killed in action last July, as was first reported to the parents by a letter from a comrade of the soldier, and not wounded in an undetermined degree, as was later officially reported by the war department was the information contained in a second message by Mr. Caufield yesterday from Adjutant General Harris, Washington.

The message yesterday received stated that Sergt. Caufield was killed in action July 30. There was added an explanatory line, which stated that the sergeant was previously reported to have been wounded July 1, but all details were omitted. The last letter received from him by Mr. and Mrs. Caufield was written on a piece of wrapping paper last June and from the appearance of the sheet it appeared to the parents that the sergeant had improved an opportunity while in the trenches to let them know that all was well with him then.


On September 21 a letter was received from one of Sergeant Caufield's comrades, in which the parents were told that their son had been killed in action late in July, but until November 29 the information thus received could neither be confirmed nor proved inaccurate. On the later date an official telegram was sent from Washington advising that the sergeant had been wounded, degree undetermined, which was the last word obtained up to yesterday, when another message came, saying:

"Sergeant Royal A. Caufield previously reported wounded in action July 18 now reported killed in action July 29."

"Harris, Adjutant General."


The soldier's middle initial is "A," not "C," and it had not been determined yesterday whether the misspelling of the name was due to a typographical error.

## COUNTY DIVISION PLAN IS REJECTED

Special Commercial Club Committee Recommends Stand Against Any Partisan.

Members of the special committee appointed to investigate the testimony given in both sides of the plan to establish a new county, with Belt as the county seat, reported to the directors of the club yesterday morning. The committee took a stand against any partition of the county and presented resolutions, which were adopted.

President Grant Call then appointed the following special legislative committee: S. S. Warden, S. S. Pordien, L. Callaway and Adam Stimpert. This committee will have as its duty the investigation of any matters similar to the county division bill which come before the club.

The Resolution.

Following is the resolution which the directors approved:

"Whereas, There has come before the directors of the Great Falls Commercial club the matter of giving consideration to new counties being instituted out of portions of Cascade county; and

"Whereas, That in the opinion of the directors that it clearly appears that a majority of the taxpayers within the limits of the proposed new counties are opposed to the creation of such counties; that the creation of any proposed counties will not subserve any good governmental object, but on the contrary, will impose additional burdens upon the people residing within the new counties, without giving them any corresponding benefits, and at the same time will injure Cascade county; and

"Whereas, The tax rate of Cascade county is a reasonable one; the county seat of this county may be reached from any part of the county in less than three hours by automobile or rail; all parts of Cascade county are being well served in every governmental capacity under present conditions; and every reasonable convenience is afforded to the residents of Cascade county as it is now constituted; Be it

"Resolved, That in the judgment of the directors it does not appear that there is any present necessity whatsoever for the creation of any new counties which will embrace any portion of Cascade county; on the contrary, every good reason demands that this county be left intact. It is further resolved that no construction when governmental agencies are taxed with so many various problems, to place any new burdens upon the people; instead of further disturbing conditions, it is essential that the business of the country be permitted to resume under stable conditions as speedily as possible. It is further

"Resolved, That the Great Falls Commercial club will oppose any and all measures looking to the creation of any new counties which will include any portion of Cascade county as it is at present constituted; and the senators and members of the house of representatives from Cascade county are hereby respectfully urged to oppose any and all such measures to the utmost."

## THEIR COUSIN IS HEAD OF DIVISION

The cousin who has been occupying the center of the stage is Major General Evan M. Another of their relatives who is serving abroad with the army is Dr. Charles G. Davies, who is a captain in the medical corps. Captain Davies is of Blue Island, Ill., and is a son of a veteran of the Civil war.
