WARM WEATHER IS HINDERING WORK

Great Northern Much Behind in Getting Ice Supply for Passenger Service.

The continued warm weather during a period of the year when the thermometer is usually registering 20 and 30 degrees below has presented another problem to the superintendent of this division of the Great Northern and that is the cutting of ice for use on dining cars next summer.

A small quantity of ice was cut from the river and stored in the passenger ice house the early part of January but since that time it has been impossible to get to the supply. The amount cut then was only about half a ton. This division, which includes Great Falls, Billings, Helena and Butte, requires an annual supply of 13,675 tons and formerly the major part of this has been obtained from the Missouri river around this city. Some ice is being cut from the Elk park section at Butte and a small supply has been stored at Helena, but the entire amount of ice cut and stored at Great Falls, Butte and Helena will not exceed 3,000 tons, leaving over 10,000 tons yet to be stored. A week of cold weather would enable the Great Northern to complete its supply for the coming summer, but if the worst should come the ice would have to be shipped to the various points in this division from North Dakota, where better luck has been experienced this year in getting an ice supply.
