SYNDICATE TO PURCHASE KENTUCKY RACE TRACKS

Louisville, Ky., Jan. 30.—Lexington advices, quoting State Senator Thomas A. Combs, indicate that all four Kentucky race tracks will then be the possession of a syndicate of horsemen and business men shortly.

According to Combs, he has made a cash payment on the \$850,000 purchase price for the Latonia and Douglas park tracks, and has secured an option on 75 per cent of the stock of the new Louisville Jockey club and the Kentucky association, respective owners of Churchill Downs and the course at Lexington.

WOLVES DOING A BIG DAMAGE

Reports From Tiger Butte Country Tell of Their Depredation There.

W. J. Derrick, deputy supervisor of the Jefferson national forest has returned from a week's inspection trip to Deep Creek park. While away he made a survey for the proposed range improvements in the park for the coming summer.

He reports that wolves are killing the stock, not to any great extent in the park, but across the river and in the Tiger Butte country. Six wolves have been killed by hunters thus far during the winter.

Mr. Derrick says that there is no snow on the open range with the exception of drifts in the gulches, and but few cattle have had to be fed by their owners. Most of the trails are icy and in bad condition.

GIBBONS-CHIP FIGHT EXPECTED TO DRAW 5000

Northwest Fans Go Wild Over Battle—Scalpers Easily Get \$3 for \$1 Tickets.

Duluth, Jan. 30.—"I will not try to box with Gibbons Friday night, but will fight from going to go and try for the knockout, for that would bring a fortune to me," said George Chip, former title holder, today.

It is said that the fight between Mike Gibbons, of St. Paul, and George Chip will bring out about 5,000 fans from over the entire Northwest. Scalpers are selling \$1 tickets for \$3, but this practice is being frowned on by the fight officials and steps have been taken to have warrants issued for the arrest of the scalpers.

A large delegation of Twin City fight fans have reserved a block of seats and are expected to arrive here early Friday. Gibbons, in a message, said that he is confident of victory and that he is in the very best of condition.

DIAMOND DUST

Cincinnati, Jan. 30.—Pat Moran, former manager of the Philadelphia National league baseball club, signed a contract today to manage the Cincinnati Nationals during the season of 1919. Moran was assured that he would be signed for the 1920 season, if his work proves satisfactory.

Chicago, Jan. 30.—Pitcher Urban ("Red") Faber, having received his discharge from the navy, signed tonight with the Chicago Americans. Faber pitched the White Sox to three of the four victories in the world's series of 1917 against New York.

New York, Jan. 30.—No decision will be given for probably two weeks in the case of Hal Chase, Cincinnati first baseman, charged by officials of that club with attempting to influence the results of games last season, it was announced tonight by President John A. Hevlier, at the close of a five-hour trial at National league headquarters.

Chicago, Jan. 30.—Invasion of South America by major league baseball teams next winter is the plan of Charles A. Coniskey, owner of the White Sox, who has arrived from Florida, where he has been for several weeks. Mr. Coniskey said he made tentative plans to combine forces with the New York Giants and send two teams to South America shortly after the close of next season.

New York, Jan. 30.—The New York Giants will play 15 exhibition games with American league clubs next spring. An eight-game series with the Boston Red Sox will start at the Boston training camp at Tampa on March 29. A seven-game series with Washington will start April 14 at a point to be selected later. The series will close with two games in Washington April 19 and 21.

TO FIGHT SCAB AMONG HERDS

Bureau of Animal Industry to Send Men Into This District to Combat Disease.

Dr. A. Berdan, veterinary inspector of the bureau of animal industry has returned from Helena where he has been conferring with Rudolph L. Snyder, inspector in charge of the state of Montana. Dr. Berdan states that as much as cattle scab has been reported in his district it is probable that four more men will be sent here to combat the disease. They will work with Dr. Berdan on this, and other divisions which need attention in the district. Most of the work will be on the reservation. One of the new men will probably arrive within a week or so.
