NO PRECIPITATION DURING PAST MONTH IN GLASGOW AREA

Weather Such That Farmers Have Been Able to Work in Fields.

Glasgow, Feb. 2.—The meteorological record of the special observer of the U. S. weather bureau at Glasgow for the month of January, 1919, shows that unusually warm weather prevailed.

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Mining News of Butte During the Past Week

Special to The Daily Tribune.
Butte, Feb. 1.—The outstanding feature probably since the inauguration of a policy of curtailment by the mining companies of Butte is the greatly increased efficiency of the miner who has been retained, his working ability having enhanced to such an extent as to call for more than passing mention.

Operations at the Black Rock mine of the Butte & Superior Mining company well illustrate the growing disposition of the miner to work now that jobs are scarce and the cost of living high.

The mean maximum temperature was 39.5 degrees, the mean minimum temperature 25.9 degrees.

There was no precipitation during the month, which is an unusual occurrence for January. There were 4 1/2 inches of snow on the ground on the first of the month, two inches on the 15th and none on the last day of the month.

At the Main Range mine of the Tuolumne Copper company production is being maintained at the rate of three tons per man daily, a record which is not being equaled anywhere in the district.

Mining conditions, however, are in favor of a good tonnage showing at the Main Range, the ore being so soft that it easily is mined and the width of such dimension that tonnage can be had with the least labor.

Davis-Daly operations also are showing a marked improvement, but the efforts at that property are to be headed toward the opening of a score more of fissures and the blocking out of ore to be in readiness for the hoisting of a large tonnage when copper metal conditions have readjusted themselves.

The Anaconda mines report marked improvement in labor efficiency and the operating sheet for the past two months will show a considerable improvement, from the standpoint of economy of operation for the tonnage of rock handled.

Whether in the mining of ore or in development work the per man efficiency unit is the all-governing essential, and the companies at the present are utilizing the best miners to catch up on development work and in the blocking out of additional tonnage.
