CRUELTY CHARGED IN KENISON CASE

Wife Has Long List of Grievances Against Her Husband and Names Them in Suit.

A divorce action in which extreme cruelty is the allegation made by the plaintiff was filed yesterday in district court by Ida Jane Kenison, who directs her suit against William H. Kenison, to whom she was married at Fairmont, Minn., May 14, 1890. Mrs. Kenison accuses her husband of calling her vile and indecent names, falsely accusing her of unchastity, being fault finding and nagging, abusing their children, having a jealous disposition and an ugly and unmanageable temper. On November 14, 1918, she declares, while she was ill with Spanish influenza, he ordered her out of the house.

Mrs. Kenison asks for a decree of divorce, custody of their two minor children, \$50 per month for her support during pendency of the action and \$1,000 alimony.

SERIOUSLY HURT IN AN INCIDENT

Miss Shiell Sustains Bad Fracture When Auto Is Over- turned on West Side.

As the result of an auto accident which occurred on the Manchester road west of this city Sunday night, Miss Winifred Shiell of 600 First avenue southwest, and a teacher in the Vaughn school district, is quite seriously ill at the Deaconess hospital.

The auto in which Miss Shiell and three others were riding was overturned, it is reported, in an effort to pass another car, the driver of which had negligently failed to dim his lights, whose brightness for the instant blinded the driver of the car in which Miss Shiell was riding, causing him to turn too far out of the road, running over a slight embankment and thus overturning the car.

Miss Shiell was the most seriously hurt, suffering a fracture of the pelvic bone. Miss Hazel Bailey of Project, who was also in the auto, sustained a broken nose, but the other two occupants received no injury other than a bad shaking up.

Miss Shiell was reported to be doing as well as could be expected last evening, but it will be several weeks before she is able to resume her school duties.

HOLE IN GROUND ALL TO BE LEFT

Wreckers of Paris Ruins Will Take Down Walls and Clear Away All Debris.

Real progress is now in evidence in the removal of the wreck caused by the fire of the Paris Dry Goods company's block which occurred on Jan. 20. The ashes and wreckage is being rapidly cleaned out of the portion that was occupied by the Paris dry goods store, the wall is being taken down at the west end of the block and the frame buildings which stood north of the Kenyon & Wheeler drug store are being razed as rapidly as a large force of workmen can accomplish that work.

The contractor is handling the work now by driving the wagons which haul the rubbish down into the basement portion of the Paris and by so doing loads are being gotten out quite rapidly. There still is some showing at times of charred and damaged goods which had not been completely consumed by the flames, but there was nothing found yesterday that was worth anything in its original form and was worth something only as old rags.

One of the things recovered from the basement was the remains of the contents of a trunk of one of the boys who went to the army camp while working at the store and left his personal belongings in his trunk in one end of the basement. When he returns he will learn of the finding of the trunk after the fire and that his clothes and other effects were ruined by the water that flooded that portion of the basement.

Workmen are tearing down the old frame buildings at the northwest corner of the block. There is quite a bit of lumber that can be saved from those structures and a lot of glass that will be available for use. The roof was torn off yesterday and part of the frame work has been wrecked. The workmen are finding this a cleaner process than getting the debris out of the main centers of the fire where the Paris dry goods store, the Dixie jewelry store and the Kenyon & Wheeler drug store were. The bricks are being taken from the walls of the brick structure by workmen with picks, and a large portion of the bricks will be saved.

The contract for cleaning away the wreck includes tearing out the foundation, as well as taking out all of the debris left by the fire, and taking down all the walls. S. S. Singer, president of the Paris company, said that there would be nothing left but "a hole in the ground" when the contractor quits the place. He said also, that there would be no further work at that place for the present, after the wreck has been cleaned away.

The time of the officers of the Paris Dry Goods company, Mr. Singer, Fred A. Fligman and the manager, W. M. Baldwin, has been given exclusively for the past week to the problem of where the business of the company can be resumed temporarily. It is disclosing no trade secrets when the assertion is made that the company will build upon the site of the block destroyed by fire and that when they do build it will be a structure that will be an ornament to the city and to the state of Montana. But it has been repeatedly stated by the company officials that they want to get back into business quickly and that to do so they will have to find temporary quarters. Yesterday it was said by one of the officers of the company that the matter still is much up in the air, while they hoped to get the matter cleared up this week, they were not in a position to say when they could make any authoritative announcement. They appear to be much in the same position that existed a week ago, for then they were hopeful of an early solution, but things didn't develop as rapidly as they hoped. Yesterday Mr. Singer said that it would be useless to conjecture when they could tell just what they were to do, and he would not make any forecasts.

undoubtedly are in Great Falls a considerable number of men who will this morning ponder for a minute or two over the few remarks passed in district court yesterday by Judge J. B. Leslie after he passed sentence on Dick Morris, a confessed gambler. Morris was arrested in a gambling raid in the old Waller pool hall some time ago by County Attorney George A. Judson and Constable Harry Conover and until yesterday refused to admit that he was guilty. Appearing before the court on final arraignment, however, he changed his mind, acknowledged his offense and was sentenced to serve 90 days in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$100.

"Gambling is against the law," remarked Judge Leslie after pronouncing sentence on the prisoner, "and men found guilty in this court on that charge need expect no leniency. I hope this will be a lesson to the present prisoner. Anyone who participates in a game of chance does so knowing his act is in violation of the law and when apprehended has no good reason to expect the court to lightly consider the offense. So far as I am concerned, gamblers will be heavily penalized when brot into this court and convicted."

There is another case pending against Morris and John Waller and it was reported at the time of the arrest Morris admitted guilt therein.

Sheriff J. P. Burns and County Attorney H. G. Benner have both announced that they will rigidly enforce the law against gambling, and two raids have been conducted by Sheriff Burns and alleged violators arrested during the past week. In two instances the suspects have acknowledged their guilt to the sheriff's office and are quoted as saying they are ready to so plead.

Choteau Boy Writes That He's in Germany With Occupying Army
