

METHODISTS LAUNCH AFTER WAR PROJECT

Also Celebrating Hundredth Anniversary of the Founding of Missionaries—Meetings Here Will Arouse Interest in Centenary.

Sub-district meetings to be held at the Great Falls First Methodist church February 17 and 18 will be principally to arouse interest in the Methodist reconstruction program and the big centenary celebration to be held at Columbus, Ohio, in June.

The Methodist church is now celebrating the hundredth anniversary of the founding of missionary work. During the past hundred years Methodist missions have been established in twenty-three countries.

The centenary celebration gives the occasion for the boldest venture of any church in all ages. A program of world reconstruction is projected. The motive behind the program is to have the gospel of Christ preached to every human being during the next five years that men might be regenerated and the world made a safe place.

The organization. The Methodist Episcopal church and the Methodist Episcopal church south, comprising a membership and constituency of ten million people in the United States are organically united in the centenary project.

For the purpose of bringing the centenary message to every church in the area, 51 conventions are now being held by three teams composed of men of national reputation.

Team No. 1 has, in addition to local speakers, the following national men: Dr. E. K. Billingsley, Dr. Robert Warner and Dr. H. C. Northcott.

Team No. 2 is headed by Dr. W. D. Shutz, Dr. C. J. Bernhardt and Rev. Philip Haines. Their schedule is as follows: Whitefish, Feb. 10-11; Brady, Feb. 13-14; Great Falls, Feb. 17-18; Lewistown, Feb. 18-19; Roundup, Feb. 20-21; Minnie, Feb. 24-25; Miles, Feb. 26-27; Billings, Feb. 27-28; Livingston, March 3-4; Butte, March 5-6.

Team No. 3 is headed by Dr. J. J. Luce, Dr. H. D. Johnson and Dr. George Mecklenburg. Their schedule is as follows: Blackfoot, Idaho, Feb. 10-11; Pocatello, Feb. 11-12; Burley, Feb. 13-14; Twin Falls, Feb. 17-18; Gooding, Feb. 19-20; Glenn's Ferry, Feb. 25-26; Nampa, Feb. 27-28; Payette, March 3-4; Island City, March 4-5; Enterprise, March 6-7; Haines, March 10-11.

An up-to-the-minute constructive and almost revolutionary centenary program is to be instituted in every local Methodist church in the land. This is not to be a temporary matter. The new organization and new life is to be a permanent factor in the church.

Another feature of this new movement in the church is the appointment of laymen in every local church to act as Methodist minute men. These men will receive special instruction in world reconstruction and will be called upon to speak five minutes in every service.

The centenary reconstruction program will require 53,000 highly trained young men and women for full-time Christian service. These recruits will be obtained by a system of personal work and draft.


