

ROBINETTE FOUND NOT GUILTY BY JURY

A verdict of not guilty was returned shortly after the noon-recess in district court yesterday by the jury hearing evidence in the case of the state against Avi Robinette. The defendant was charged with assaulting Archie Goings,

proprietor of what was formerly the Office saloon, with a knife on the evening of November 9. Goings received a deep knife wound on the left jaw during a fight that followed a cry of "To hell with the kaiser," Robinette admitting when on the stand that he repeated the slogan which was on the day of the peace celebration so universally used on the street and declaring that he was immediately confronted by a man who de-

manded to be informed as to why he made that remark. There followed a fight, Goings emerging with a wound in his jaw and Robinette in the hands of the police. Robinette testified that he had no weapon, did not inflict the wound suffered by Goings and that he did not know whether Goings was the man who objected to his remark about the kaiser. The state produced witnesses who testified that they saw something resembling a knife in Robinette's hand while the fight was in progress. Robinette is a widower with two children, both of whom were in court with him during the trial. Otto Gerth and J. R. Swan appeared as his counsel and County Attorney H. G. Bennett and Deputy W. J. Tighe conducted the state's case.
