IT WILL FORCE A SUSPENSION

Butte Situation Leaves No Other Alternative for the B. & M. Copper Refineries.

Effects of the situation at Butte on the copper industry in Great Falls probably will begin to be felt first the latter part of the week, if conditions at the copper camp are not materially modified within the next few hours. It will happen that the first to feel the effect of idleness at Butte will be the copper refineries, and they will have to close because of lack of material within the next few days, if no further supplies are available, as now seems imminent. The copper refineries employ something more than 200 men. The zinc plant at the B. & M. can continue to run for some time on concentrates on hand, the exact length of time that it might be operated without further shipments being somewhat problematical, but it will be for some days, probably, after the copper refineries are forced to close. The same is true of the operation of the rod and wire mill, and it is the plan to continue the operation of that branch of the B. & M. works for the present at least. Naturally, the management and the men at the B. & M. are keenly interested in the situation at Butte and are anxious to learn of some adjustment that may bring a settled condition there as soon as little effect here as possible.

Miss Wertheim has been one of the social leaders of the city for a few years and during the last year she was especially active in war work and efforts to finance war work activities. She is easily one of the most popular and well liked girls of Great Falls. Mr. Goldman is a native Californian and has been practicing law in the city of San Francisco where he was born, since about the time he was 21 years of age. He graduated first from the San Francisco high school and immediately entered the University of California at Berkeley from where he received his degree of bachelor of arts when only 19 years of age, graduating with the class of 1907. He at once entered the Hastings College of law and was a member of the class of 1911.
