

BUTTE'S SCALP IS ALSO DANGLING ON THE LINE

Great Falls Basketball Team Finishes Games Up to District Contest Without a Defeat. Last Win, 30 to 16.

With the winning of everything in sight and a slate full of victories and not one game lost, the Great Falls high school basketball team closed its season last night when it defeated the fast Butte team in a 30 to 16 score on the local floor.

The old saying that a game is won or lost during the first five minutes again proved true last night when with a good—almost brilliant—start Carmody made three successful field throws and Holkesvig one, totaling a score of eight for the local team before the visitors had had a fairly good chance at the ball.

Carmody's good aim continued thru the first half and at the blowing of the whistle the score stood 22 to 8, with 14 credited to Carmody, four to Holkesvig and four to Moriarty. Bayer, Butte's left forward, made one basket for his team and the other three were listed in favor of McAuliff, the center.

The first half was the best exhibition of real basket ball. Butte put up a strong fight and guarded the local forwards with glue like persistence. The game was fast and both teams put up a hard fight for the ball and both sides made futile risks at long basket tosses.

The last half which ended up with an

8 to 8 score was much slower and both sides seemed to relax the tension which was at its height thruout the first half. The Butte players started the second half with a determination to catch up with their opponents but the local team was too far ahead for them to make much headway.

Butte played unusually hard for a number of minutes and by displaying some very good team work kept the ball from Great Falls long enough to make a few more baskets. McAuliff for Butte made six points the last half and Ruckerfeller right forward for the visitors scored once.

Thruout the game was exceptionally clean and an unusual fact was that no points were made on free throws. But one foul was listed during the entire game, a fact noticeably contrasted with the Lewistown game of last Friday. Coach Donohue of Butte made the trip with his team.

Coach Crouch has worked hard with his team for several months and has been successful in putting his boys into shape which classed them near the head of the list of teams in the state. The victorious season just past makes a splendid record for the Great Falls boys to start their tournament games beginning Friday, February 28, with the

House bill 15, by Conser, providing an additional judge for the 16th judicial district composed of Custer and Fallon counties.

House bill 172, by Jones, of Cascade, amending the firemen's disability law.

House bill 214, by Corry, relating to the maintenance of special improvement districts outside the cities and towns.

Senate bill 31, by Larson, providing for the licensing of engineers of hoisting engines.

Senate amendments to house bill 135, by Sinclair, providing for the sale of small timber from state lands.

House bill 168, by Black, relating to building and loan associations. This was amended to make the penalty for withdrawals of stock equal to one per cent of the par value of the stock withdrawn.

SENDING LETTERS TO THE LOVED ONES

Home Service of Red Cross Is Ready to Help Those Wanting This Assistance.

The Red Cross home service, as part of its work of helpfulness in the community, has made arrangements to send messages to relatives living in enemy countries. Regular mail service has not been open to Germany or Austria or Russia, and it may not be open again for several months. With the war over, people here are more anxious than ever to have some word from their loved ones in the home land. A workman from Galicia, or Austrian Poland, had not heard for four years, from his wife and three little children. It had been impossible to send them the money saved from his wages. The army had swept again and again over the region near his old home. Four long years, and not a word to tell whether they were living or dead. Some one directed him to the Red Cross. The Home Service wrote for him a letter in English on the prescribed form in sent to Switzerland, translated there into Polish, and mailed to Poland.

"How much shall I pay?" the man asked.

"Not a penny, not even a postage stamp. The Red Cross of this county is glad to help you."

"I'd give a thousand dollars if I could hear from them."

And no doubt he will soon hear, for thousands of answers have been coming back thru the same channel.

There is a home service information bureau in every branch. Tell your neighbors about it, whether they have boys in the service or not.
