

NEW YORK MARKET

FINANCIAL.

New York, Feb. 19.—Pools, syndicates and professional operators as a whole monopolized the broader and more active trading on the stock exchange, today, the movement in the main comprehending many specialties at materially higher levels.

There were several noteworthy exceptions however, rails and shippings making very indifferent response, while United States Steel was irregular until the close, when heavy accumulation caused a one point gain.

Much bullish enthusiasm was attributed to the reported attitude of congress toward the terms of the "Victory" loan the proposed substitution of short term notes of several classes being viewed with marked favor.

Outstanding features of the session included motors and their subsidiaries, tobacco, oils, equipments and utilities, notably local tractions. Fertilizer and food specialties also registered substantial gains.

Kelly-Springfield Tire overshadowed the entire list at an extreme gain of 12 points, nearly all of which it held; United Cigars rose five points, Texas Company and Mexican Petroleum 2 to 3 points, and Industrial Alcohol four points.

Pressed Steel Car, Baldwin Locomotive and General Electric strengthened on reports of forthcoming domestic contracts, and leading metals improved moderately. Sales amounted to 587,000 shares.

Bonds were steady, all Liberty issues except 3 1/2's gaining from 1/4 to 1/2 per cent and Paris 6's rising 1/2 per cent to 100 1/4, a high record. Total sales (par value) aggregated \$112,500,000. 4 1/2's United States bonds unchanged on call.

The copper market closed nominally 16 to 17. It was reported one of the largest producers was offering under 17. Liberty bonds, 3 1/2's, \$98.48; first convertible 4's, \$92.84; second 4's, \$92.78; first convertible 4 1/2's, \$92.04; second convertible 4 1/2's, \$94.12; third 4 1/2's, \$95.54; fourth 4 1/2's, \$94.14.

Stock Market as seen by Bulls & Bears

(Reported by H. B. Lake & Co.)

New York, Feb. 19.—Today's session was featured by an exceptional display of strength in numerous specialties although in the last half hour, the market in general displayed buoyancy with the general run of prices at about the best of the day. In the steel group, the element committed to the bear side have been offered stubborn opposition to advancing tendencies and it seems to be good opinion that an exceedingly large short interest exists in this section of the list.

Indications that future government financing will be conducted in a way contrary to previous efforts was well received in the street. We are among those who believe that security prices are in the process of discounting a return of more prosperous trade conditions and feel as that the buying side of the stock market should be pursued. Total sales: Stocks \$81,900; bonds \$13,947,000.
