SMELTER HOCKEY TEAM DEFILES ALL

Will Meet Any Seven in Montana for State Honors at This Game.

Manager "Dave" Clark of the B. & M. Smelter Hockey club, city champions, has issued a challenge to all teams in the state for either one game or a series of contests for the championship of Montana. The B. & M. team, containing three former Canadian cricks and a few other fast experienced men, is a snappy seven and has demonstrated this fact on Gibson lake this season.

Would Meet Butte. Manager Clark says the aggregation is especially eager to try conclusions with the Butte team and feels confident a series of two games, one in Great Falls and the other at Butte, would draw large crowds of fans. In such a series the total goals scored would determine the winner in case each team took a game. It is understood here that the Montana metropolis has several fast men on skates and could readily get together a good aggregation, one which would give the B. & M. smelter men a run for the honors. However, the local team feels certain it can hold its own against all comers and is prepared to meet Butte at any time.

Strong Line-up. The B. & M. team has an unusually strong line-up. Carley, who will probably guard the net for the smelter men, is a cautious goal tender, uses his head at all times and has the faculty of stopping the low, skimming shots, the kind considered the most liable to cause trouble to an opposing goal mender.

Reliance at point at one time was one of the star Canadian professionals. Altho he is a bit out of practice now, not having played for perhaps six or seven years, he is still one of the best in the country and has shown by his occasional rushes this year that he is a dangerous defense man to any opposing seven.

Kratt at center is a former Houghton (Michigan) high school player, this school at one time having a record of having won the high school hockey championship of northern Michigan, a section of the country where hockey originated in the United States, for seven consecutive years.

Clark at center, altho perhaps the most experienced and oldest player in point of years in the state, in spite of being also one of the lightest stick handlers, can play the center position with the best of them, and has the additional attribute of being able to hold out at

top speed longer than any other man on the B. & M. aggregation.

Morrison at rover is considered by many Great Falls fans as being the star stick handler in the city. He has plenty of weight and has a cool head and a wicked, accurate shot. He also can make himself at home either at individual or combination play, especially the latter, and he and Clark make a great center ice pair.

Houle at right wing is the youngest man on the team, but makes up in consistent effort what he lacks in experience. He plays well in combinations and is a good shot.

Peterson at left wing is one of the best forwards in the state without question. He plays at top speed all the time and never lets up on the puck. He has the uncanny faculty of always being in his position on a pass from his fellow forwards and would be certain to be one of the biggest scorers in a championship match where scores were made in any quantity at all.

Great Falls hockey fans believe this team would stand a show against Butte and are willing to support any games between the two teams with their attendance.

HOOVER TO DIRECT BIG RELIEF FUND

Clothed With Full Authority in Expenditure of \$100,000,000.

Washington, March 2.—Herbert Hoover has been appointed by President Wilson as director general of the American relief administration, created under the new \$100,000,000 European family relief bill with full authority to direct the furnishing of foodstuffs and other urgent supplies purchased out of relief fund and to arrange for their transportation, distribution and administration.

Mr. Hoover, who already had been made director general of allied relief under the commission sitting at Paris, also was given full power by the president to determine to which of the populations named in the relief bill the supplies shall be furnished and in what quantities. He also is to arrange for reimbursement so far as possible as provided in the relief act.

In making public the president's executive order tonight, the food administration announced that Edgar Richard and Theodore F. Whitmarsh, who have been directing the affairs of the food administration during Mr. Hoover's absence in Europe, had been appointed as joint directors in the United States of the newly created relief administration.

RAY REPEATS HIS LAST YEAR TRICK

Again Wins Hunter Mile Feature of Boston Athletic Games.

Boston, March 2.—Joie W. Ray, of the Illinois Athletic club, Saturday night repeated his victory of last year in the Hunter mile feature event of the annual Boston Athletic association games. His time of 4 minutes 22 1-5 seconds, was a new record for the event, displacing the mark of 4 minutes 23 3-5 seconds made by Oscar Hedlund of the Boston A. A. The old record had stood seven years.

At the finish Ray led Joe Stout, of the University of Chicago, western conference two-mile champion, by 40 yards. Defeat of Lieutenant Robert Simpson, 44th infantry, U. S. A., by Earl J. Thompson, Dartmouth student, marked the 45 yards high hurdles. Thompson, who is the present national 120 yards hurdles champion, took the lead at the start and held it easily. His time was 6 1-5 seconds.

Miles City, March 2.—Custer high won the basketball championship of eastern Montana as the result of the tournament completed at Glendive. The scores of the games played were: Custer high 20, Glendive 14, Fairview 42, Terry 20.

Whitefish Business Men Ready to Build

Special to The Daily Tribune. Whitefish, March 2.—Several of the leading business men of the city are making preparations to improve their holdings. At a cost of \$20,000, J. E. Skyles will enclose with a brick fire wall the Pioneer Mercantile company block, having a 75-foot frontage and 100 feet deep. The Colonial building, the Hori cafe and the Northern hotel, all owned by M. M. Hori, will undergo the process of remodeling and improvement. The three structures will be encased in brick walls, and a full length concrete basement will be placed under the hotel, besides building the present structure back to the alley, a distance of 130 feet. This work will entail an expenditure of about \$10,000.

McCarthy Bros. & Akey will construct a modern fireproof garage on Central avenue, having a frontage of 50 feet and 130 feet deep. Concrete will be the material used. At present there has been no shortage of labor, due to an influx of laborers from other points, but with the construction work as outlined above, this promises to be an exceptionally busy season in the industrial line.

DANIELS TELLS HOW TO GET \$60 BONUS

Not Payable to Heirs or Legal Representatives, Says Statement.

Washington, March 2.—Secretary Daniels tonight issued a statement showing procedure to be followed in obtaining payment of the \$60 gratuity granted under the new revenue bill to persons honorably discharged or released from actual duty in the naval establishment during the war.

The statement said those entitled to the gratuity were officers and enlisted men of the navy and marine corps; naval reservists, male and female, and persons in the service of the coast guard, coast and geodetic survey and lighthouse service who performed active duty with the navy during the present war.

Such persons, however, will not be entitled to the gratuity if they have already received one month's pay on discharge from the army under the act of May 18, 1917, or if they are entitled to retired pay. Gratuities, it was also pointed out, are not payable to heirs or legal representatives.

Payment upon discharge or release from active duty will be made by the supply office charged with final settlement of account. Persons already separated from the service if in the navy or naval reserve force, should make claim for payment upon the naval bureau of supplies and accounts, at Washington. If in the marine corps, upon the officer who settled their accounts, unless his whereabouts are unknown or he was a navy supply officer, in which case claim should be forwarded to marine corps headquarters at Washington and if in the coast guard, upon coast guard headquarters at Washington.

Claims may be made by letter, and must be accompanied by a statement of service and original certificate of discharge or order is lost, a duplicate must be submitted together with a statement from the officer making final settlement of account showing that no gratuity was paid upon discharge.

CAPTAIN TAKES POSITION

Harris, who served thruout the European war, was wounded and gassed, has taken a position with the Pioneer Mercantile company as assistant in the shoes and gents' furnishings department. He left an English hospital on November 11, the day the armistice was signed.
