affirmative action by the supreme court hinged the supplemental proceeding instituted by the Elm Orlu.

This supplemental suit claims, by virtue of the proving of the apex of the pyle vein through the length of the Elm Orlu claim since the hearing of the original suit, just decided by the supreme court, an additional 529 feet along the course of the Rainbow vein under the surface of the Black Rock claim below a depth of about 11 feet. The tonnage represented in this additional vein area claimed is at least 10 times more than that in that portion of the Rainbow vein now decreed by the supreme court to belong to the Elm Orlu, and it practically involves the heart of the Butte & Superior mine.

The Butte & Superior company has been mining in this controverted ground from the 1,800-level up, the ore returns being deposited with the clerk of the federal court pending the outcome of the supplemental suit. In addition, the Butte & Superior has put up as security about \$700,000 worth of Liberty bonds.

For ore extracted from this controverted ground the Elm Orlu, it is estimated, will claim damages up to \$8,000,000, and it is also estimated that approximately 45 per cent of the Butte & Superior's zinc and silver output to date has been mined from the territory in dispute.

Judge Bourquin decided the Elm Orlu was the prior location and that the pyle vein united with the Rainbow; that the Rainbow became the pyle vein below the

junction; but he reserved decision as to ownership below the junction as the court stated the apex of the pyle vein at that time was not proved. Immediately the Elm Orlu interests began work to prove it and they claim they have opened and proved it through the length of the surface of the Elm Orlu. Each side, in preparation for the original suit and the supplemental action up to date, has expended approximately \$500,000, raises having been driven from the 1,100-foot level to the surface in addition to long cross-cuts and drifts.

The original suit quieted title for the Elm Orlu to 970 feet along the course of the Rainbow vein, which included 301 feet on this vein in the Black Rock claim. The supplemental action does not mean that the Butte & Superior will be without ore in the event of an adverse decision, as considerable tonnage has been developed east of the controverted section and in the Four Johns claim adjoining the Black Rock. The largest ore bodies of the Black Rock mine, however, are involved.

President Signs Victory Loan Bill and Trade Elixir

Washington, March 3.—President Wilson tonight signed the Victory loan bill, authorizing the treasury to issue \$7,000,000,000 in short term notes and providing \$1,000,000,000 for the use of the war finance corporation in stimulating the country's foreign commerce.

The Resolution.

Senator Lodge's resolution follows:

"Whereas, under the constitution it is a function of the senate to advise and consent to, or dissent from, the ratification of any treaty of the United States and no such treaty can become operative without the consent of the senate expressed by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the senators present; and

"Whereas, owing to the victory of the arms of the United States and of the nations with whom it is associated, a peace conference was convened and is now in session at Paris for the purpose of settling the terms of peace; and

"Whereas, a committee of the conference has proposed a constitution for a league of nations and the proposal is now before the peace conference for its consideration. Now, therefore, be it

"Resolved, by the senate of the United States, in discharge of its constitutional duty of advice in regard to treaties, that it is the sense of the senate that, while it is its desire that the nations of the world should unite to promote peace and general disarmament, the constitution of the league of nations, in the form now proposed to the peace conference, should not be accepted by the United States. And be it

"Resolved, further, that it is the sense of the senate that the negotiations on the part of the United States should immediately be directed to the utmost expedition of the urgent business of negotiating peace terms with Germany satisfactory to the United States and the nations with whom the United States is associated in the war against the German government; and the proposal for a league of nations to insure the permanent peace of the world should be then taken up for careful and serious consideration.

MacSPADDEN SENT BACK TO OLD POST

Popular County Agent Soon Will Resume Duty After Being in Army.

The Cascade county farm bureau and the board of county commissioners have been notified of the re-appointment of F. E. MacSpadden as county agent for Cascade county, the appointment to take effect on March 1. This news is well received throughout the county, for Mr. MacSpadden's work during the short time he was in charge was highly satisfactory and all the people with whom he cooperated are ready to welcome him back for the Cascade county people consider Mr. MacSpadden one of the best county agents in the state.

As evidence of the regard in which Mr. MacSpadden's work was held by the U. S. government he had tried to enlist with the U. S. forces soon after the declaration of war and was automatically sent back by government officials, because of the work he was doing here. He finally succeeded in getting into the service early last July when he left for Camp Fremont, Cal., being assigned to the military police regiment. He was transferred from Camp Fremont to Camp Mills, from which camp he received orders to sail for overseas duty, just too late, the armistice being signed a few days before his regiment was scheduled to sail.

Mr. MacSpadden received his honorable discharge last December and since that time has been visiting his parents at Missoula. He has not yet arrived in Great Falls to resume his duties as county agent, but is expected to in a few days.
