STEEPER GIVES INTERESTING TALK TO CLUB WOMEN.

Many of the school problems which have been confronting the mothers of Great Falls who have boys or girls attending the Central high school were made clearer yesterday to those 75 or 100 mothers who heard the address given by H. T. Steeper, principal of the local high school, at the meeting of the mothers' section of the Woman's club held in the palm room of Hotel Rainbow.

Perhaps the most interesting, and the problem which has confronted the Great Falls parents and which was satisfactorily discussed yesterday afternoon, was that of the double session for the high school students. The double session is being tried out in the local high school for the first time since its establishment this year, and from reports given by Mr. Steeper and by a number of the mothers present, it is evidently proving a "howling success." There are fewer failures among the student body and on the whole the students have reached a higher average in their school work with the double session.

Several other interesting points were discussed and the mothers were especially urged to co-operate with Mr. Steeper in solving the problems which often arise before their boys and girls in their school duties. A round-table discussion followed his talk.

During the business session the nomination for officers was put on the table until the meeting next Monday, when the mothers' section will hold it jointly with the economics section.

The board of directors met at 2:30 for a brief business session, but no matters of importance were transacted at this time.

ATWATER BACK ON ASSIGNMENT

Well Known Deputy in Collector's Department to Be Stationed Here Some Time.

Coming to assist in handling the income tax returns from this section of the state, A. B. Atwater, a special deputy attached to the internal revenue district, arrived in the city yesterday and took up his duties at the office in the county court house. He will be associated with H. M. Dengler, another deputy who has been here for some time, and until the forms for the returns by corporations arrive, he will be engaged with Mr. Dengler in helping to make out the individual returns and after the other forms are received he will give most of his time to assisting in making the returns for the corporations.

"It seems like getting home" said Mr. Atwater last evening, "to get back to Great Falls to enjoy working in this section for I have always found the people here an especially pleasant, broadminded lot of individuals. When I was here last year, I found them good natured always and anxious and ready to meet the government requirements to the letter. There is a heavier tax this year but I am sure they will be just as pleasant to work with and will be just as good humored, because all know that the government has been called upon to make extraordinary outlays in bringing the war to a successful issue. Naturally, that class of people reduces the amount of detail for the collector's department for they always keep an efficient corps of help and their returns are made out in good shape. It thus becomes merely a matter of checking up."

"There is another advantage in coming again to the Great Falls district for work on the income tax. It causes me to be associated with one of the best informed men in the service in the northwest and I am sure that Mr. Dengler has already gotten before the public much information of helpful nature so that those who pay income tax will approach that duty with better understanding of just what is wanted this year than they did last, since the whole proposition was new and little understood by the rank and file at that time."

Mr. Atwater was assigned to the Great Falls office last year to handle the work of making the income tax returns and made many friends while here on duty. The business men of the city made a successful appeal to the department to have him kept in the city for one month after the limit originally allotted to this post and he performed a large amount of work while here. He has been traveling about the state on income tax work and other assignments of the internal revenue department most of the time since he left Great Falls, being at home only about three months in the time and that three months being just prior to leaving Helena for this city, where he arrived yesterday afternoon.

TAX GATHERER IS MAKING HIS CALL

Collector Mann Working in This City Among Dealers of Various Classes.

F. L. Mann, deputy revenue collector in charge of the work of gathering the tax from the cigar and tobacco dealers, the taxicab owners, the poolroom proprietors, druggists on their narcotics and the managers of theaters in the city looking after his work for the Great Falls territory. He says he finds the business interests willing to perform their obligations promptly but not in possession of the facts required to make their returns and he is endeavoring to assist them in that duty. He calls attention to the fact that as the law was but recently enacted there has not been opportunity to get the information generally circulated but the department is doing everything possible to advise all who will be required to pay taxes just what is expected of them.

One of the interesting items of the new taxes is that of taxicab taxes. Every proprietor of a five passenger taxicab will be required to pay a federal tax of \$10 and for every seven passenger taxicab the tax will be \$20 annually. Previous to this was the taxicab license which has been replaced by a tax to the city in which they operated but no other tax except that assessed generally against property.

ICE HARVEST IS FURNISHING WORK

Soldiers and Sailors Given Employment by Local Companies in Taking Supply.

Fifteen soldiers and a number of civilians began work with the People's Ice company yesterday and an order for about 30 more soldiers to help in the ice harvest with the Great Falls Ice company is expected soon, according to Corporal Myles of the soldiers' division of the U. S. employment bureau.

Corporal Myles says that he has nothing but praise for the business men of the city who have co-operated with the Soldiers' and Sailors' club to help solve the labor problem. Openings are being made for the returned men and but a comparative few unemployed soldiers are now listed.

DAILY SERVICE TO THE NORTH

Trains to Sweet Grass Put Back to Former Schedule From This City.

Trains No. 239 and 240 beginning with today, March 4, will run out of Great Falls thru Sweet Grass daily, according to word received in the city yesterday by David G. Black, general agent for the Great Northern. This change in the train schedule has been authorized by the federal manager of the Great Northern at St. Paul and was largely due to the result of a meeting held a short time ago by the board of commissioners of the Canadian Pacific railway. At the meeting of the latter, it was decided that the Canadian Pacific train which hitherto had been giving tri-weekly service to Coult's would be changed to daily service taking effect about March 1.

The Great Northern until about five months ago made the daily run thru to Sweet Grass but owing to the change in the schedule of the Canadian Pacific to tri-weekly service it was found unnecessary for that company to continue the daily service to Sweet Grass, immigrants to Canada then finding it compulsory to stop over at Sweet Grass until they could make connections with the Canadian Pacific.




