HEALTH SURVEYS IN AMERICAN CITIES

Health surveys of many cities in the United States will result from the activities of the working conditions service, Department of Labor, in the next few years. Two or three such surveys will begin very soon. The problem of securing industrial health begins within workshops and factories. There must be sanitary surroundings and equipment, and proper protection for workers employed in hazardous processes or using poisonous materials. Workers must be taught how to keep well and to guard against physical disabilities. Simple fundamentals of personal hygiene should be taught by the plant physician. In order to maintain a healthy working force, it is often necessary to trace the causes of sickness outside the work place into the industrial community or the workers' home. The fact that the personnel of the division of industrial hygiene and medicine of the working conditions service is detailed from the United States Public Health Service will enable the division to make comprehensive surveys, taking all casual conditions into consideration.

The close relationship of the health of workmen by the service, which is working out careful plans for investigating the sources and methods of handling milk, meats, and other perishable food supplies wherever investigations are made.

Milk is perhaps more than any other food product a potential disease carrier if sanitary measures are not observed in its handling, and its great importance as a food for young children necessitates the careful following of milk from the dairy to the consumer's home. Sanitary arrangements in bakeries

and public dining rooms are also of tremendous importance to workers as well as to the community, and in investigations along this line not only the cleanliness of the quarters occupied, the utensils used in handling food, and the methods of cleansing dishes, etc., but also the health and cleanliness of workers and their clothing will be considered. In many places where other conditions are excellent, the medical experts have found lax regulations about washing their hands and taking care to keep foodstuffs from contamination.

WANTS HUSBAND TO SUPPORT HER

Mrs. Christiana Harris Seeks Court Order to Secure Her Legal Rights.

Alleging that her husband deserted her December 28, 1918, without cause and that he has since that time lived apart from her and refused to provide for her support, Christiana Harris yesterday brot suit in district court against Ernest Harris, alias Camel Harris, for the purpose of forcing him to furnish her with separate maintenance. She informs the court that she is without means; that the defendant has notified local merchants he will not be responsible for debts contracted by her and that owing to her delicate condition she is unable to work. Harris has told her he will not support her unless he is ordered to do so by the court, the complaint continues, and she petitions the court to do just that. He is a railroad man and earning \$150 per month, Mrs. Harris declares.
