Y. W. C. A. BEGINS WORK IN PORTO RICO.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the National War Work council of the Y. W. C. A. held recently at headquarters, 400 Lexington avenue, it was voted to appoint a committee to direct the beginning of Y. W. C. A. work in Porto Rico and carry it on until such time as this work can be taken over by the national board of the Y. W. C. A.

The appointment of the committee was indicated by the request of the Porto Rican women's committee of the Council of National Defense for co-operation in the work of aiding women prisoners and delinquent girls on the island. The Council for Defense has started a school in the jail and is assisting women in getting needlework.

Two hostesses' houses, one for colored and one for white troops, were opened at Camp Las Casas last autumn and will close during the next month after having served the needs of the continuously during the influenza epidemic in Porto Rico. The motion of the War Work council therefore means a continuation and expansion of work begun.

Mrs. E. M. Townsend, chairman of the hostesses' house committee, reported that 90 hostesses' houses are still in operation in camps throughout the country and two more were opened this past week.

for this day that it will be difficult for any man, woman or child in Great Falls to fail to give at least one dime toward the benefit of the poor starving babies, wounded soldiers and consumptives of France.

The milk bottles which have been placed in the different stores of the city were robbed on Saturday and their contents for the month amounted to \$37.50. One dime will save the life of a baby for one day and every child is urged to save the pennies unnecessarily spent for sweets, sodas and ice cream and contribute them to the fund for Free Milk for France.

RUSTLE CROWD FOR EXCURSION

Roundup Committee Will Start Today Getting the Names of Delegates to Miles City.

This morning the committee in charge of the special train which will be run from Great Falls to Miles City for the big annual roundup of the stockmen of Montana at the convention of the Montana Stockgrowers' association to be held April 15 and 16, will get busy in sending out appeals to the stockmen and farmers to become members if they are not already enrolled and if they are enrolled to pay another year's dues. The committee, consisting of H. E. Lee, vice president and manager of the Commercial National bank; W. K. Flowerree, vice president of the American Bank & Trust company, and F. R. Van de Putter, of the Park hotel, propose to make this the biggest excursion that was ever sent from one Montana city to another carrying a convention delegation.

The people of Miles City have extended an invitation to Great Falls distinguished artist, Charles M. Russell, to attend the roundup as a guest of honor of Miles City and while Mr. Russell may not announce his plans for a few days, it is believed he will attend. If he decides to accept the invitation, the Great Falls party will insist that he become a guest of the big special and travel to Miles City with the home crowd.

The purpose of the Stock Growers' association formerly was to help catch the cattle rustlers and then send them to the penitentiary, but the purpose of the association of the present day is to encourage the more general growing of stock and improvement of the herds of the state. The association is especially interested in getting the farmers to grow at least a few head of cattle and it urges the growing of the best quality, showing that the best breeds more than pay for the difference in the original investment by the better prices for the beef animals produced when ready for market.
