Stock Market as seen by Bulls & Bears

New York, March 12.—A big broad stock market was witnessed today and the dealings again above the million share mark. This shows that the public interest in asserting itself rather strongly. Many issues established new high levels which brought out profit taking which gained in volume as the session went along. The weight of realizing sales in the afternoon dealings erased a good part of the initial gains and in some departments losses were shown. There was nothing of special significance in the day's news. Re-action such as occurred yesterday must be expected but we believe we are in a period where stock market prices are beginning to discount a very reasonable price for business conditions. Total sales 1,228,000.

NEW YORK MARKET FINANCIAL. New York, March 12.—Transactions in stocks today again ran well over the million share mark, the advance, which embraced numerous high points for the year, being according to general belief, by substantial public participation. Influential factors included news advices from abroad which strengthened the hope of an early ratification of the treaty, and the progress of events in Washington and in the financial quarters which virtually insures sufficient funds for efficient maintenance of the railroads. Ralls led the strong opening but fell back quite generally in the final hour, United States Steel also declining sharply after attaining a new high fluctuating movement, but the undertone, at the close, was strong. The more spectacular features of the day were Texas company, at an extreme gain of 1 1/2 points; Industrial Alcohol, 5 1/2; Studebaker and Baldwin Locomotive, 5 1/2; American Tobacco and various specialties 1 to 3 points, subject to irregular reaction. Sales amounted to 1,225,000 shares. Bonds were neglected in the excitement attending the stock market, but a steady rise in rates in domestic and foreign issues on relatively light dealings. Total sales (par value), aggregated \$2,400,000. United States coupon and registered 4's gained 1/2 per cent on call. Liberty Bonds: 2 1/2's, \$98.56; first 4's, \$102.28; second 4's, \$98.76; third 4's, \$95.24; fourth 4's, \$93.90.

Chicago, March 12.—Sensational upturn in the value of hogs, notwithstanding withdrawal of all restrictions on hog shipments, made the corn market today jump to the highest level yet this season for March delivery—\$1.48 a bushel. Prices of hogs advanced 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 cents, with May \$1.40 @ \$1.40, and July \$1.35 @ \$1.35. Oats gained 1/4 @ 1/2 cent and provisions 1/2 to 1 1/2.
