**CLUB HELPS MEN FILL IN BLANKS**  
While None Is Needed, They Will Assist in Getting the Bonus.

Secretary Al Griffiths of the Cascade County Soldiers and Sailors club announces the club will help the returned soldiers and sailors procure their \$60 bonus money from the government, even though the blanks are not necessary. The club has had a number of forms multi-graphed, and instead of writing a letter with their discharge papers, the men can apply for a form at the clubrooms, Valeria building, next door to the public library, and they will be given forms and assisted in filling them out.

These forms are simple and furnish the government with the information, covering the men's service from April 6, 1917 to the end of the war. All soldiers and sailors interested are asked to apply for forms at the club. While the forms are not really required yet the club feels it is doing the returned men a good service by having them.

The executive committee of the club has distributed the following concerning the French Military band which will play at the Grand theater March 20:  
"On the 20th the French Military band will be in the city. We are under obligations to this band in a few ways. All men who are not working are asked to be at the Soldiers and Sailors club, Valeria building, not later than 1:45 p. m., March 20, to form an escort for the French from the Great Northern depot to the hotel. Uniformed men are especially invited to participate in this parade. Everybody get in."

**POULTRY PEOPLE HAVE ORGANIZED**  
George Charlesworth Named President—Will Conduct Show This Season.

George F. Charlesworth was elected president of the Great Falls Poultry association which was organized at a meeting held Thursday evening in the Bancker's Hall at Fire Insurance company's offices. This meeting was attended by 42 enthusiastic chicken fanciers of the city for the main purpose of forming a poultry association and interesting the citizens of Great Falls in thorough poultry.

A number of poultry associations are being organized throughout the state and only two weeks ago a splendid association was organized at Lewistown.

The Great Falls association plans to put on a poultry show in Great Falls sometime this next fall and also to compete with Butte to bring the state show to this city. The last poultry show held in this city was six years ago and at that time over 900 birds were shown but the interest in pure bred poultry in this city died shortly after. It is planned to make the show which will be held by the association this fall one of the best ever shown in this state.

Because of the interest in poultry which is being generally aroused thru the whole country the membership of the Great Falls association will not be limited to chicken fanciers of Great Falls nor even to Cascade county, but to the state, the officers and members present at the organization are planning on making this one of the most important associations of Montana, and anyone interested in poultry raising can become a member.

The meetings will be held on each month and the directors will be appointed at the next meeting on April 3.

**SAYS TAX WON'T ACCOMPLISH AIM**  
Convinced Revenue Derived from Sporting Goods Will Not Meet Estimates.

J. J. Flaherty, president of the Great Falls Paper company calls attention to the fact that the new revenue tax on sporting goods which was aimed to catch professional baseball clubs, he says, will not accomplish the object congress intended it to.

Mr. Flaherty points out that over 70 per cent of the baseball goods used in this country are purchased by boys under the age of 18 years. These youngsters escape the tax and therefore the revenue on the other 30 per cent or less will be small in comparison with what it was hoped the revenue sum would be, according to the way he sees it.

**LOCAL BOWLERS OFF TO HELENA**  
Enterprise Team Will Roll the Butte Five on the Capitol Alleys.

Members of the Enterprise Bowling team will leave today for Helena and tomorrow afternoon will roll against the Butte quint on the alleys in the capital city. The local team is considered one of the best in the state and the boys expect to bring home the bacon. The men making the trip will be Dawley, Linnane, Bronston, Ruzick and Richards.

The merry-go-round tourney closed at the Enterprise alleys last evening. The tournament during the past 15 days was the most successful from one standpoint of any yet held. There were more entrants than in any previous merry-go-round this season. Another tournament commences today.

**State Institutions' Means for Fighting Fire Being Inspected**  
Helena, March 14.—A complete inspection of the fire fighting equipment of the various state institutions is being conducted by State Fire Marshal R. S. Mentrum and State Auditor George Porter. The inspections have been completed at the insane asylum at Warm Springs, the Orphans' home at Twin Bridges and the Home for the deaf and blind at Boulder. An inspection will be made at the industrial school at Miles City within a few days.

**35 Aliens Will Be Deported as Soon as Peace Is Declared**  
Salt Lake City, March 14.—Immediately upon the signing of the peace pact between the central powers and the allies and United States, 35 enemy aliens in the war prison barracks at Fort Douglas will be deported to Germany and Austria. Most of the men are members of the I. W. W., but they are enemy aliens, too.

**PHEENEY SAYS IT IS GROWING FAST**  
Former Resident Makes His Second Visit to Great Falls in 18 Years.

Two visits in 18 years and those sufficiently far apart to give him rather accurate notions of the stride that Great Falls has been maintaining in its growth caused P. J. Pheenev, who was in the city yesterday on business for the Great Northern railroad, with which he has been associated for many years to be very enthusiastic about the city when talking with the men he had known when he was city agent for the Great Northern in this city two scores of years ago. Just as when he made his home here, Mr. Pheenev likes Great Falls, he says, and he declared that he would not hesitate to recommend it as a place to reside for any one whom he might hear inquire about where they could find a real live and promising city.

Mr. Pheenev was in the city looking after the interests of the Great Northern company while making a tour over the company's lines.
